### **MISSIONS** New opportunities

Your faithful giving to the FBC Abilene church budget is allowing missions to happen all around the world. Just this week, the Missions Committee voted to partially fund two vehicle fundraising requests.

The **first one** is in Matamoros, Mexico and Marv Know, CBF Field Coordinator of Fellowship Southwest. Your funds will help Pastor Eleuterio Gonzalez minister to immigrants in large government-run shelters. Pastor Gonzalez will have a dependable way to move immigrants around the city working on their asylum process, safe from the cartels and the dangers of traveling by foot. Other CBF Texas churches are joining in with this effort to provide Pastor Gonzalez with a newer more dependable van as he demonstrates the Gospel in action through transportation.

The **second** approved vehicle request which came to the Missions Committee is from our very own church members, Alicia and Jeff Lee. The Lee's work in Skopje, Macedonia has increased significantly over the past 3 months due to the pandemic and a delivery truck is desperately needed at this time. This delivery truck will allow food boxes to be delivered from the Macedonia Food Bank (which FBC helped to start), fresh milk and dairy products (from our FBC milk cows) to be delivered to struggling families, food and supplies to be delivered to Poraka (a ministry home to adults with disabilities), and then available for disaster relief coordination through the Lee's ministry. Other CBF churches financial gifts will be added to our gift to complete this request and make this happen.

Again, **your gifts to the FBC Abilene church budget** allow requests like these to be fulfilled. New opportunities to help spread the gospel in our world today happen because of your faithfulness in giving to the church budget. **Thank you for being a church who supports and cares for our world and these powerful ministries!**

**UDOPUS** FOR THE JOURNEY

What do we do when there doesn't seem to be an ending and the pattern is unpredictable...? I received an article from Teresa Ellis written by Patrick Mead, pastor of Fourth Avenue Church of Christ in Franklin, Tennessee, who posed such a dilemma using the analogy of movies and books. When he watches a movie, he checks how long it will last. Even though the suspense remains, it allows him to understand the pattern and when to anticipate the resolution of the crisis. When he reads a book, he looks at the number of pages. Let's say it has 400 pages. He trusts that even though the plot gets really dark with insurmountable problems on page 200, Patrick knows the writer still has 150 pages "to sort everything out."

I know personally from watching Disney movies some patterns are predicable. After spending two weeks with my granddaughter, I can quote dialogue from *Beauty and the Beast, The Lion King*, and *Frozen I* and *II*. For a Disney movie according to Jeffrey Katzenberg, a great story has a hero, a crisis, a great enemy or villain, and the final resolution. Even though the plot goes from bad to worse, the pattern is predictable – all will end well – happily ever after.

Patrick Mead suggests, as we live through this time, we are characters in a movie which we sure didn't write. This isn't like a predictable Disney movie, but we do face a great enemy in our movie...by the way it is a virus called COVID-19...it is not each other, or people who wear masks, or those who don't wear masks.

The story-line of our movie has all kinds of unexpected twists. The difficult decision of when to reopen school has found its way into the plot. We also face racial conflict and growing division. We wonder how it will be resolved. Throw in an election year and the plot grows more complex.

When we know the Disney pattern, we understand that even if the plot thickens in 30 minutes left in *Frozen II*,

the crisis will be resolved and the town of Arendelle will be saved. Yet, in our movie we aren't sure what page we are on or how much time is left as we stumble over new twists to the plot.

Do you remember when all of this started way back on March 15 with the decision to suspend in-person worship. The two-weeks to flatten the curve has become 134 days. How much time is left in this movie. You mean I'm only on page 120 of this 400-page book. Patrick Mead says, *"We have no idea where we are in this story...and that makes it so very hard to be strong."* 

A definition of stress is not knowing there is an end to a certain situation or problem – it is ongoing. We think we have a finish line; yet, it keeps getting moved. We thought we were running the mile, but discover we entered a marathon. Whether we think all of this has been a hoax, much to do about nothing, or wearing a mask from day one, we have all grown weary. We wonder when it will end. We also wonder how life will have changed when this movie rolls the final credits.

Here is a jubilant word of hope for the weary. The prophet Isaiah said to Israel when they were demoralized after 60 years in captivity: *"The Lord is the everlasting God.... He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. ...those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength."* 

This past Sunday, we sang a timely song, "Way Maker." The words: "You are here moving in our midst… You are, Way maker, miracle worker, promise keeper, light in the darkness my God…. Even when I don't feel it, You're working." As we go through these days, trust "God works for good in all things." This "movie" belongs to God and the Lord is the Hero…just wait and you will find out.

### **WORSHIP AND MUSIC**

During COVID-19, the ministry of worship and music has been busy with much needed technical upgrades, purchase of new music for worship, ongoing activities to maintain connection to those within the ministry, and virtual meetings which discuss emerging technologies for ministry, coping with the temporary loss of choirs, and trends which can be anticipated as we look toward emergence from this season of ministry.

First, as travel restrictions lifted, we have been able to complete a much-needed upgrade to our monitoring system which is used by instrumentalists in worship. We have installed a new in-ear monitoring system made by AVIOM which will allow instrumentalists to better hear what is being said, sung, and played while not adding sound to the platform area. This reduction in platform sound will actually allow members of the congregation to hear all that is sung and spoken with greater clarity. Additionally, when the full orchestra is playing, their sound will be richer and fuller as a result of this upgrade. As the 'digital church' has advanced rapidly during this pandemic, we have also made substantive improvements to the television and streaming broadcasts of weekly services.

Second, plans continue to move forward by purchasing new music for use by the orchestra, choir, and congregation. These additions will continue the rich musical heritage that has been a part of Worship@FBC for many years.

Third, members of the worship and music ministry have regularly met in virtual ZOOM rehearsals. These rehearsals have featured times of sharing together, prayer, spiritual growth, and information. We have had the opportunity to be joined in these rehearsals by composers, arrangers, orchestrators, and leaders in church music from across the country. These meetings have given us insight into these gifted musicians allowing us to better understand their music, and to inform us as we commit to pray for them and the ministry the Lord has given them.

Finally, virtual meetings with those outside the church have included times of enrichment with ministers of music from across the state and nation. We have gathered to share insights into the new normal of online worship, but look forward to the time when we can return to weekly worship with full choirs and instruments. While many may find discouragement in these days, many of us are looking to the future with great anticipation with seeking and trusting hearts. Seeking God's direction in the days and trusting He is at work and has a great new work for us in the days ahead.

#### **YOUNG ADULTS**

What strange times we are living in. COVID-19 has disrupted our world. I still forget to grab my mask as I'm leaving my car, but the bright side is I've gotten more steps in having to go back and get it! It can be a nuisance, but I really like what Dr. Christopher said about wearing the mask. It makes us more aware of our breath, which reminds us of the everpresent Spirit of God. My hope is we don't take that lightly but instead, allow it to help us move through this chaotic time with faith, hope, and love trusting God is with us as we live in the unknown.

I've been thankful that coffee shops and restaurants have remained open. It's where a lot of my good conversations with students and young adults happen. Meeting with them during COVID-19 has been uplifting and encouraging as I listen to their stories of how they have spent their time and what has helped them move through it. I've had great conversations ranging from "where's God in all this?" to "How do I live with my parents again when I've experienced freedom at college?" I've also had those conversations with some parents. This is what we do. It's how we love one another. It's how we stay connected to one another.

COVID-19 has created some questions for all churches and how we move forward. One new venture I'm attempting is starting a new small group for post-grad young adults. This group will meet in someone's home (with proper physical distancing of course) once a week. We'll start with some young adults who are already members of First Baptist and then hope to create a space where young adults with questions about God, church, or faith in general would feel comfortable coming to discuss those hard questions. I invite you to be praying for this new ministry within the young adult group as FBC continues our efforts to make the city of Abilene look more like heaven each and every day.

As we continue to live through and try to understand how to safely do ministry in the midst of the pandemic, I have been asked several questions, several times, so I thought I might try to answer some of them. So, here goes:

#### When will we start having Sunday school again?

My answer is also two-fold; we have not stopped having Sunday school, just not like we were used to, and I am not sure! The first half of the answer is easy because of the great work folks have done to have a time of Bible study with their class. Now, not all of the classes are meeting at the normal 9:00 a.m. on Sunday morning, but rather when it works best for the class members. I know there are a couple of classes who have not been meeting by Zoom, but plan to start in the next week or so. As well, C.V. Blake has been recording a Bible study lesson each week and we have been posting it on Facebook and emailing a link to it on Fridays. As far as the latter part of my answer, no definite date has been set, but it will be later in September at the earliest. We are wanting to see how the start of school affects the virus numbers.

#### What is happening with the Hope Center?

The Hope Center Building Team met recently to look over some initial drawings prepared by the architect. They were able to narrow down the focus as far as direction of how the two main projects (City Light and GLO) would lay on the Hope Center property. Financially, we are encouraged with how funding continues to come in and look forward to seeing some of the work begin. Chair Larry Smith continues to meet with the various ministries to garner ideas and ministry plans.

#### How is the church doing financially?

As you can see on the back page, we are just a shy of \$91,000 under collected through July. In a normal summer, that would be fairly normal. So, in the midst of these crazy times when for the most part folks have not been able to come since March, it is somewhat encouraging. In addition, because of the lack of programming, we are underspent in light of the giving and so we are in a strong financial position to go into the fall.
