I was talking with Becky about the passage from James for the children's message. I said, *"Old James keeps telling us again to 'not to be merely hearers of the Word, but doers."* He keeps this theme up in chapter two: *"What good is it my brothers and sisters if someone claims to have faith, but no deeds?" I remarked James can sound like a broken record. Becky's come back: <i>"Sometimes we need a broken record to tell us over and over again what we miss."* We all need such repetition. We learn the alphabet by hearing the letters over and over again. Until we first learn the alphabet, we will never know the joy of reading.

We hear, "I'm into God's Word." Great. The question is: "Has God's Word gotten into us as "living word?" Tim Hansel said, "All of our theology must eventually become biography." We could paraphrase his challenge: "God's story in the Bible must eventually become part of our story of transformation."

Our defenses can go up when we think of *"doing more."* Today we fight another virus which takes our breath and energy away. It is the fatigue of doing. But, we aren't talking about doing more and enjoying it less.... It

is about doing the "Word" of God which brings abundant life. The "Word" does not burden us, but frees us. Being "doers of the Word" is about divine transformation. Richard Rohr writes: "The trouble is that we have made the Bible into a bunch of ideas - which can be right or wrong - rather than an invitation to a new set of eyes."

Remember James' image of looking at yourself in a mirror and walking away, forgetting what you saw. We can look into the mirror of God's Word and walk away forgetting what we saw and heard. We keep seeing with the old eyes. We fail to see with amazement the words of life. As the old hymn calls: *"Let me more of their beauty to see, wonderful words of life."*

As I prepare to retire, I want to help you look in the mirror and see what God says about giving. At the end of September, I will no longer be an employee of the church. I'm not inviting you to consider your giving just to fund my salary. I share this for your spiritual growth and to know the joy of giving. The Word is clear about the handling of our finances. The Bible contains 500 verses on prayer and faith, but well over 2,000 verses on money. Forty percent of Jesus' parables deal with our

possessions. Will you hear and see... and become *"doers of the Word?"*

Malachi teaches us how to order our priorities which can free and bless us. God instructs us: "Bring the whole tithe or the first ten-percent into the store house so there may be food in MY storehouse. Test me in this" says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven...." Some might say, "That's Old Testament." Yes, but it is also the very "Word of God." For your sakes, don't just "hear" where those words have no lasting impact.

God's "Word" to give to Him is an incredible journey which will transform us. The tithe, the 10%, is the acknowledgement that everything we have belongs to God, the source of gratitude. As we give, we learn God will provide, even more than we can imagine. As we give and look in the mirror, we start seeing the face of Christ whose very nature is to give.

I realize the discussions have started about the next Senior Pastor. What can you do for our church to prepare and prepare for the one who will come? You have a major role to play, even though you are not on the

search committee. You can begin to pray first about what God wants, more than what you want. You can attend the gatherings later this fall to have conversations about the church. You especially can be strong in your giving to God and to His mission. As you take this journey, I pray that even more than a calling a new Pastor, you will see with a new set of eyes God's calling on you and know the joy of being "doers of the Word."

BAPTIST STUDIES CENTER

First Baptist Family,

Thank you so much for your support this year as I started the Baptist Studies Center at Abilene Christian University. Through your support this year, the Center was able to get off to a strong start, and to begin building ways to help support regional churches and to train the next generation of ministers for Baptist churches.

With the closure of Logsdon Seminary, the need remainsnow more than ever-for there to be trained ministers in Baptist churches in West Texas and beyond. With that in mind, I, with help from numerous supporters, began the Baptist Studies Center in the ACU Graduate School of Theology. Our mission is two-fold: 1) to provide resources and networking for area congregations, and 2) to provide theological education for Baptist seminarians, to prepare them for ministry. By offering courses in Baptist History, and Baptist Polity and Theology, the Baptist Studies Center offers students, as they are passing through any of ACU's excellent graduate ministry degrees, the ability to be trained in Baptist life and theology.

The task is large, for it includes not only preparing classes and doing normal faculty duties, but fundraising, recruiting students, meeting pastors and church leaders across the area, providing resources for congregations, and more—all in the midst of a pandemic!

That being said, now that the first academic year is closed out, I wanted to tell you about a few of our successes:

--We brought in three new students to the ACU Graduate School of Theology, with more on the way for Fall 2021.

--We hosted four webinars for churches, on the future of Baptist life, on how to deal with church abuse, on pastors and politics, and on college and young adult ministry. We were fortunate to have some great speakers join us, such as our own Meredith Stone, ministers from across the BGCT and CBF, as well as best-selling authors like Scot McKnight and Jemar Tisby.

--I preached at, or visited with, ministers from over 50 churches regionally about the work we're doing, as well as connected with state and national Baptist leaders. Much of the work of this first year was simply about establishing networks and making connections with leaders in Baptist life for future recruiting and ministry. --With generous support from nine churches, several individuals, and foundations like the Shelton Family Foundation and the C.I.O.S. Foundation, we were able to raise the funds necessary to meet our financial obligations for the 2020-2021 academic year. My position for the foreseeable future—will be fundraised, making support from churches like FBC all the more important.

--The first course in Baptist History was completed this Spring, with six students on board. It was an excellent introduction for our Baptist students to their own history, with students from other backgrounds mixed in as well. One of the great benefits to Baptists is that it lets them know their own history and theology while learning in the company of other members of the body of Christ.

I'd love your prayers as I continue to make plans for the next academic year. I've got a great expanded slate of programming I'm looking forward to for the 2021-2022 year, and hopefully several students. Here are some ways you can specifically pray for us:

I) That students would continue to come

2) That churches and individuals would continue to financially support the work

3) That ministers would be faithfully trained, and that churches would be blessed by our work.

Thanks again for being our church home, and for being supportive of this new venture. Forty years ago, the line between the Churches of Christ and Baptists was bright. But today, I'm hopeful that what we're doing can not only be a way to train the next generation of ministers, but to help mend divides which plagued Christians for far too long.

MISSION BITE: Hello from Phnom Penh!

When we last wrote to you, COVID-19 cases were still somewhat high, but we were optimistic. We had just been vaccinated, along with most of the adults in Phnom Penh, and there was a small glimmer of possibility we could resume teaching seminars in Kampot Province at the end of June–or at least soon thereafter. Now as July ticks away, churches and schools are still closed, cases are generally higher than before, and the provinces are struggling to contain outbreaks without the resources of the city. Hundreds of Cambodian migrant workers test positive each day at the border as they return home from Thailand or Vietnam, where even bigger outbreaks mean they can no longer find work.

It's hard to know exactly what is happening around us because the government is not releasing information as transparently as before, but COVID-19is certainly hitting those we know hard. The teenage son of our main Cambodian partner got sick earlier this month, and while caring for him, so did our partner. A friend of a friend in her 30s passed away from COVID-19. A young factory worker at our church is infected and is currently in a state treatment facility. Cases seem to be rising in Kampot Province as well. There is certainly plenty here to keep us praying, and we hope that you can join us in that as well.

What does this mean for life and ministry for us here? We are continuing to work from home and continue to prepare seminars for pastors in Kampot for the day when we are all able to travel and gather again. Using the gifts of many of you to our ministry, we continue to help support our Cambodian Baptist partners as they distribute rice and the gospel message to hungry families throughout the country. Some Zoom preaching opportunities have begun. We were able to do a bit of outdoor hosting at our house, and we are exploring ways to be able to do more of that.

While at times, we grow weary of the restrictions and the unknown and the "here we go again" feelings, we are also thankful for the ways God has continued to show His faithfulness to us and to those with whom we minister. Recently, Chloe has doubled down on her love of classic hymns. To give us a break from singing them repeatedly, we bought an album to put on for her. Many times a day we sing along to "Are You Washed in the Blood." As we sing the line, "Are you fully trusting in His grace this hour?", we are reminded of what we need to do to get through this season. We are praying this for all of you today, too—that you would trust in God's grace and that His grace would abound in you and in your lives each hour and each day.

Prayer Request from Phnom Penh

We think prayer makes a difference. Here are some ways you can pray for us:

Praise God that our partner and his son have now made a full recovery. Please pray for Sokleang, the young Bible student and factory worker in our church, who is currently being treated for COVID-19. Also, please pray for the grandma in our church, Grandma Seap. There are rigid rules around vaccinations here, and her health conditions prevented her from being vaccinated. She is particularly vulnerable, both to getting the disease and fighting it, if she becomes infected.

Pray for Kampot Province, especially the pastors and churches we work with there. Pray that God would protect Christians there and help them to be a witness to their neighbors. Pray that seminars would resume in God's timing.

Pray for us as we ask how God wants to use us during this time. Since we have to take a step back from being out and about, it can also be helpful to take a figurative step back to think, plan, dream, and ask what God may have for us that we haven't had the eyes to see yet. Pray that we would be open and faithful to God's leading.

S. reached out to me to see if we could assist. Thanks to the generous gifts of CBF partners and churches we were able to provide not only the needed dental work, but also provide the glasses the doctor prescribed so that the daughter could see more clearly.
