Last Thursday, we spent the afternoon texting and talking with Natalie and Andrew about their plans of leaving Victoria with the approaching Hurricane Harvey. At one time, when the storm was more tropical or a Category 1 Hurricane, it seemed like they might ride it out. As Harvey strengthened and predictions anticipated a Category 3 aimed at Victoria, they decided to leave – mandatory evacuation changes plans. They left late for Austin because Natalie had bus duty at the high school and had to stay until all of the students were gone. We were relived they were headed out of harm's way.

Natalie sent pictures of Mary Catherine safe and secure in her car seat as they prepared to leave. This was her second road trip. The first picture showed this incredible smile as if she did not have a care in the world. It looked like she could have been going to Disney World. The second picture got me and led me to experience the promises of God. Nestled down in her seat, she held one of her toys. The sight that captured my imagination was her eyes. They were the eyes of such trust. They said, "Even with an approaching storm, I am safe and I have no fear." ROUND UP SUNDAY

For the first time in several years, I was home for Round Up Sunday. And yes, despite the fact that my home address and church membership have changed, First Baptist Abilene will always be home. So much about that Sunday felt familiar. The brisket still smelled amazing, the people were kind as always, and yet there were noticeable differences. More than the giant inflatable games that were certainly absent from my earliest Round Up days, and outside of being promoted to sous chef during the preparations, there were differences all around me. So often it seems we get caught in a mix of familiarity and difference. It is much easier to cling to one or the other, but allowing yourself to stand in the uncomfortable space where things that are familiar are also different can sometimes help reveal the beauty of what some things really are.

When I arrived at the FLC on Sunday morning to help with the infamous Round Up lunch, I certainly did not expect to experience moments of such profundity. But amidst the chaos of preparation I couldn't help but pause and think about the holy acts I was witnessing. While cooking outside, one of the more experienced chefs checked the propane tanks on the grill to see if they were still full. "A little low" he said. "But it seems like every year we think we'll run out, and always have just enough." Something about that statement struck an immediate chord. I mentally archived years of Bible studies and seminary classes trying to place the sentiment and I eventually remembered the story in I Kings I7 when the Lord tells a widow something similar, "For this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry.'" Our world looks quite different from Elijah and the widow's, and yet the familiar assurance that God will provide remains the same.

All morning I witnessed familiar sights, but for some reason they caused me to stop and pay attention. The tea being mixed in jugs recalled the story of Jesus' first miracle where He turned water into wine. I noticed the movement of hands mixing coleslaw that could just have easily been kneading bread in preparation for a very different meal. When we think about communion, it can be easy to think only of the monthly practice of the Lord's Supper. It's easy to forget that what we know as the Lord's Supper began with the simple preparation of a meal between friends. Can you imagine sitting down at that table for dinner, doing something that must have felt so familiar, only to have it become something completely different? To me, this is part of the Spirit of communion. A Savior who enters our familiarities and changes everything. The bread and the wine became body and blood, a meal between friends was now sacred, and the lines between heaven and earth were all the sudden much more difficult to see.

I'm not quite sure why, but this Round Up Sunday felt different. For the first time I experienced something so familiar be so completely different, and I think for the first time saw it for what it truly is; a sacred, holy act of communion where believers in Christ share an ordinary meal together, and there was enough for us all.

My prayer is that I, and we, continue to look for the ways Jesus can help us see things both familiar and different, and recognize their goodness. In an ever changing world, the opportunities are endless. The liminal space between familiarity and difference will certainly be uncomfortable at times, but following Jesus was never really supposed to be comfortable. One thing I know, is though our paths may be different, we are all on the same journey. And when your path crosses with others on the journey, don't forget to share a meal.

MCALLEN MISSION TRIP 2017 FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, ABILENE, TEXAS

Having never had the experience to participate in a mission trip, I was excited and apprehensive to see what a small group could accomplish in a few short days. Going to McAllen in the middle of July meant temperatures were going to be very hot and make it very difficult for everyone. I was amazed at what our group was able to accomplish working through the heat and the discomfort.

About 20 of us arrived in McAllen on Sunday afternoon to meet and review our mission timeline. It seemed overwhelming. We were divided into two groups. One group was assigned to help finish and paint a home for a family, as well as finishing 10 beds. The other group was assigned to work gardens for two families. Completing the gardens for planting and planting corn for one family. God sent our group to McAllen to help these families and with our Lord this was done in only 5 days. Through God all things can be done.

This miracle would not have been made possible without the two young men I had the privilege to work with, Nathan Moore and Timothy Varghese. The work was hot, dirty, and required back breaking labor almost each day. They did not complain, outpaced some older workers, and did not need much guidance. When the rest of the world sees our children as lazy and surly without moral values, work ethics, or devotion to their Lord and parents, they have not seen these two young men. God's work in their lives is so evident.

During my careers I have worked in leadership roles and feel that that I am qualified to speak about the three leaders who accompanied our teams. John, Becky, and C.V. were the epitome of Christian leadership. They worked alongside of us, never pushing, but pulling when needed. They were organized, patient, and loving. They are truly Christian leaders.

This trip will be remembered for the people and for the work we accomplished. I feel the Lord has blessed me in many ways and I look forward to making the trip next year. The families we met and worked with were such a blessing. I felt the Lord's presence every day and I know we were doing His will.

The Buckner organization is a mission driven group with God's guidance. They are making a difference one family, one life at a time by teaching.

Holly DeShazo has been a Big A volunteer for many years, and we asked her what it means to volunteer with Big A. Here is her response:

Twenty or so years ago, I was a young mother wanting to bring my elementary age kids to church as often as possible. We lived on the far south side of Abilene and the trip to church took about twenty minutes. I would take them to choir, RA's, GA's and I would wait in the car because it just took too long to go all the way back home and then come back to pick them up. So I felt the pull to find somewhere at church to become involved. I started with third grade choir and did that for several years, and one year at a choir concert the kids from Big A Club came to watch the concert. I started asking questions about how to get involved, and the next year I was teaching third grade Big A girls.

For those who are unfamiliar with Big A Club, it is a program under City Light which picks up and brings "at risk kids" to the Family Life Center on Wednesday nights. We provide a great meal, then break into small groups and teach a lesson a lot like "Sunday school," and then have a play activity such as bowling or skating. For most of these kids, this is the only time they will hear about Jesus. Most come from broken homes, many have parents in prison, and almost all have poor living conditions. We had one girl last year who was living in a car with her family.

I've lost track of how long I've been teaching at Big A, maybe fifteen years. Big A Club was the vision of David Leyerle and is still reaching children today. I've had three great ladies helping me teach for many years now; Donna Schnitman, Connie Petross, and Sandy Utley. We would all agree that Big A has blessed us more than we ever expected. We've seen children who could break your heart, but we've seen kids accept Christ and were baptized in our church!

My children are grown now, and I no longer need a "job" to do at church while they are at their activities. I keep doing it because I love it, and because I am certain this is what God wants me to do! Big A is a ministry, but it is also a Mission. Reaching young people for Christ!

There are many ways to get involved with Big A Club, and if you're looking for a place to get plugged in, here are a few ways how. Maybe you're like me and are already bringing your family to church on Wednesday nights. High school and college students help with recreation time. Someone of any age can volunteer to just sit at the dinner tables and visit with these kids. Maybe you can drive one of our vans. You can definitely pray for these children and the success of the program.
