

REOPENING THE CHURCH?!?!

According to the new executive order issued by Governor Abbott on Monday, April 27, 2020, the plan is to start opening Texas back up for business on Friday, May I. So, what does that mean for us as a church? Well, we are not "reopening" the church, because the church has not closed. Yes, we have been meeting in a new format, but ministry has continued during this time and in some ways, it has increased!

Before we look at the answer to the reopening question, let's talk about what Governor Abbott's Open Texas Report suggests churches do. The first and foremost request is that all Texans help each other through this process. He emphasized numerous times that we must use common sense and caution with those who would fall into the high-risk categories and maintain social distances. At-risk population are those who are 65 or older, especially those with chronic lung disease; moderate to severe asthma; chronic heart disease; severe obesity; diabetes; chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis; liver disease; or weakened immune system. During Phase One, businesses must limit occupancy to 25% of their maximum occupancy. While this does not necessarily apply to church, it should be used as a guide as we want to "be a good neighbor" to those in our city.

With that in mind, Dr. Christopher is gathering a "Ingathering Team" to look at how we as a church should proceed. The team is an ad hoc group which will be comprised of: Randy Lloyd, Chair, Dr. Barry Moak, Dr. John Cole, Mark Edwards, Dick Dansby, John Weeks, Ruth Anna Driggers, Jill Gossett, Jane Todd, Richard Vandever, Margaret Henslee, and Keely Gaddis.

This group will help the staff develop a plan for the church which we will share in the coming weeks. But for now, our plan is to continue doing church as we have for the past 7 weeks. As much as we would like to simply open the doors and have everyone back together, it is just not prudent at this stage. We could have some people in the sanctuary on Sundays, but we must carefully determine who those people would be and how to ensure distancing. So for now, we will continue to worship electronically and will share any change in that method as soon as we know anything.

> So, please continue to pray: for our city, for church members, for the staff, and for this team as they seek to help us all move forward.

On Sunday, remember that many of our Sunday school classes continue to meet via Zoom and then we can all gather electronically for worship by watching live on KRBC, stream the service by going to the church website (www.fbcabilene.org), or on Facebook live.

The preacher, Gardner Taylor, tells about a trip he took by car from New York to Birmingham, Alabama, way before GPS. It was late one night when he stopped for gas at a convenient store, somewhere in Tennessee. After paying, he asked the clerk, *"Can you tell me where I am? What's the name of this place?"* The clerk asked, *"Are you lost, do you know where you are going?"* Gardner said, *"I'm not lost. I know where I came from and I know where I am going...I just wondered where I am...."*

We know, at least I pray we know as the people of God, from where we have come. No matter what we face, we come from the empty tomb, the risen Lord and the gift of Pentecost when God poured out His Spirit and Power. Even though there is major uncertainty filled with fear about the future and especially finances, we are not lost as a child of God.

But where are we in these difficult days, at least as the <u>Church?</u> Some say, we are in the "new normal." So many changes. Six weeks without gathering in the sanctuary. Small businesses are struggling to stay afloat. But, here is a word of hope, according to Tod Bolsinger, "*The Church is at this opportunity to express more clearly what it means to follow Jesus and serve God who is King of the whole world…. The church has always been a small band of people willingly to head into uncharted territory with a mission worth our devotion."*

Tod's statement captures where we are as the Church, as well as where are headed. We're off the map in uncharted territory making us anxious about the future. Some will understandably want to go back to the way things were, which isn't bad, but we have another choice in making the most of this crisis. We can learn what it means for Christians to lead when we are off the map and the old no longer works. As much as COVID-19 has created a crisis, the Church has been in a crisis for some time where Sundays are more about soccer and Starbucks, than the Sabbath. An analogy from Tod Bolsinger's book, *Canoeing the Mountains*, might help us see what we are facing, not only in the COVID-19 crisis, but in our changing culture. Lewis and Clark, the great American explorers, expected to find the Northwest Passage, or the cherished water way of the Columbia River, connecting the Pacific Ocean to the Mississippi River and then the Gulf of Mexico. Such a discovery would be like owning the internet today. But, what they encountered were the towering peaks of the Rocky Mountains stretching out for miles and miles. They could not have been more disappointed, but they were not discouraged as they adapted to the challenge.

They thought the most challenging obstacle was behind them as they canoed to the head waters of the Missouri River. They expected to descend down a gentle slope to the Pacific, but surprisingly they got the Rockies which were not on any map. In that moment, everything changed. They had planned on exploring by canoe. Now they would have to become climbers. They had to adapt to see new possibilities. They couldn't canoe the mountains. If they wanted to go forward, they had to change their plan and adapt. They kept on course – their mission didn't change. "But they adapted from riverrafters to mountain climbers," according to Bolsinger.

We are off the map in uncharted territory with COVID-19. However, we have been off the map as the Church has become one of many options. The fastest growing religious affiliation among young adults is "none." The COVID-19 crisis has reminded us we are facing our Rocky Mountains as surely as Lewis and Clark. Bolsinger says, "We are canoers who have run out of water.... So, what is needed? A spirit of adventure...and to keep going no matter what." He goes on to counsel "This is an opportunity to become true learners who stay the course of our mission, but who are ready to adapt to whatever is before us." It is time to ditch the "canoes" which got us safely this far and put on our hiking boots to reach a broken world hungry for God like never before.

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We are at an exciting crossroads. It's more than deciding when we will be back together for worship – and one day we will be. Can you imagine that celebration? We are on a life-changing journey in facing the mountains and exploring new frontiers. Perhaps our prayer doesn't need to be to go back to the "normal." Instead, God transform us, keep us on course through this uncharted territory, give us new life and a renewed passion for Your mission as we trade our "canoes" for hiking boots. By the way, even though Lewis and Clark did not discover that "waterway," they did make it over the Rockies to the Pacific...and then back home.
