MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

Listening for the leadership of the Holy Spirit is something we hope to do all the time, but the desire for spiritual discernment is particularly intense in these days of pastoral transition at FBC. We listen for the Spirit in many ways: through prayer, worship, scripture, or that "still small voice" inside. Yet another way we discern the Spirit's leading is by listening to one another — to the ways God may be speaking through each of us to the rest of the congregation in this interim time. The main venue for listening to one another in this season is through our Congregational Conversations.

In the first conversation last November, we spoke together concerning what we value most about our church. The Pastor Search Committee boiled all the comments we collected from you down to five major values for our congregation, with some elaboration of each one. We presented a summary of five chief values in our Second Congregational Conversation on January 23. These values, which you can find listed elsewhere in this edition of First Words, are a celebration of who we are, and they will become part of the Church Profile we will be developing in the near future.

In the January Congregational Conversation, we also carefully considered several metrics related to our church and community from the perspectives of a "mirror view," looking at internal church data, and a "window view," considering data about the Abilene area. Then around the tables, we talked about what all this information means for where our church is focusing its energy and where we should focus in the future. The Search Committee has begun analyzing the valuable comments we collected and will provide a summary report at our last conversation. Much of the data will also become part of our Church Profile.

The third and final Congregational Conversation will be on February 27. In that session, we will discuss the trajectory of our church — where we need to go. Our dialogue will consider the nature of our congregation, our future direction, and what kind of Senior Pastor we need to lead us. We will also be asking the congregation to respond to one or two surveys, as a way to express our ideas to the Search Committee on an individual basis. As you can see, this third conversation is a vitally important way for the committee to hear from the congregation about our future and the sort of Senior Pastor we need. We very much want you to be present to share your perspective.

Every time the doors open at City Light, we are given the opportunity to see the goodness of God and the plan He has for each one of us. We now have a City Light Market!

The City Light Market includes milk, eggs, cheese, apples, green and purple grapes, broccoli, potatoes, other fresh vegetables and fruits, along with shelf stable items, bread, and commercially prepared foods. This allows families to come choose from what is available that week to cook and use at home. We are grateful for the partnership with the Food Bank of West Central Texas which has allowed City Light to provide

more meals than ever before in 2021.
