

Records show January is the coldest month of the year. Sounds obvious. The intriguing thing about January, the bleak midwinter when "the earth is like iron and water like stone," is that it has the hint of spring with the hope of new beginnings. We make resolutions for a New Year. We look to make changes. We consider ways we can start over or grow.

Some contend January gets its name from the Latin word for "door" since it serves as a doorway to a new year. Others believe the name comes from the Roman god, Janus, who was the god of transitions and beginnings. Janus was pictured with two faces – one looking back and the other face looking forward. The symbols of a doorway and two faces catch the mood of the month.

What doorway is before you? Do you have the courage to walk through it? Where is God calling you this New Year? How do you need to say "good-bye" to something in the past? Do you need to release some nagging failure, fear, or shame? It might be as serious as saying "good-bye" to some habitual sin or sickness of the soul. Perhaps you need to say "so long" to who you think you should be to embrace who God created you to be – His beloved child.

How do you need to say, "Hello" to the future? The prophet Isaiah captures the possibilities: "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not see it right before your very eyes? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland in which we have dwelled."

Another promise of hope during January is the celebration of Epiphany, which occurs on the twelfth day after Christmas. Epipha-what? The word means, "shining, a showing, or revealing" which points to the star and our Savior in the straw for all people. Epiphany celebrates the visit of the Magi or Wise Men to see the Christ Child. They took the risk to set out and follow a star for 750 miles to Bethlehem. Yet, they weren't sure who or what they would find. They traveled in the dark

across miles of wilderness and wasteland. They walked through their doorway and they were never the same. At the end of their journey, or was it the beginning...they said hello to the future, and found their heart's desire – and they worshiped Him.

Matthew tells us "they departed by another way." Perhaps they took a different route because of the threat of Herod. Could Matthew be describing their spiritual journey and how it changed them? We have the opportunity this year to walk through a doorway, to let go of the past, to greet the future, and follow the star that can take us another way – "His Way" of peace and abundant life. This year, let us worship Him in our living, our giving, and our serving. I wonder how this year might be different if we worshiped and surrendered to "His Doorway." At the end of their journey, or was it the beginning...they said hello to the future, and found their heart's desire – and they worshiped Him.

Each one will be sharing his or her journey of faith. Those stories will be powerful moments that will touch our hearts.

We often define deacon as a noun, a position, or even an office of prestige. The New Testament often uses deacon, diakonien, as a verb to describe the posture of a deacon as one who serves. In our church, deacons are not a board of directors who govern. Deacons are servant leaders. They are called and set apart to care for the needs of the congregation. As servant-leaders they provide spiritual direction for the church.

In the service of ordination, the laying on of hands is a significant moment. This act symbolizes the blessing and expression of prayer that confirms the call of God for the deacon to minister in our congregation. This holy practice can be traced back to when Moses laid hands on Joshua and commissioned him to serve Israel. Ordination is not a ceremony of the church, but the call and claim of God most deeply rooted in the Bible: "Follow me, be the servant of all" (Mark 1:17; 10:44).

Deacons are ordained for the specific purpose of ministering in our midst. All of us have been called and ordained through the waters of baptism to discover our ministry and ways to serve. As you pray and watch those being ordained to serve as deacons, you are invited to consider your calling to serve and follow Christ. We believe every member is a minister and missionary ordained by God.

This has been especially true when my young children have shopped with one parent for the other and in particular my daughter shopping with my husband for me. It would be a videographer's delight; eye-rolling and dramatic exclamations, "Oh no, not that, Dad! That's for old ladies. Mom would never wear that." But also the excitement when they see that thing they know is perfect for him or her. "He is going to love this! I can't wait to watch him open this!" Sometimes the anticipation is so great they don't wait, bursting in the house with, "Guess what we got you for Christmas?" But if you could be the proverbial fly on the wall and witness the conspiratorial whispers and the delight of discovering the just rightness of a gift, it would magnify the magic of the moment.

It is more blessed to give, than to receive. Most of us have almost learned this as we become adults. I was just bemoaning the fact I was being a terrible shopper this year, and my son replied with this text: "Nah, I think the older we get, the less important it becomes to us material-wise. At least for me. I never understood how or why you guys could say you didn't want anything for Christmas, but now it is more difficult for me to think of something I want, than it is scary to imagine getting nothing. Which is to say you rock and played Santa wonderfully well for many years and we all appreciate you enough to know that as adults, the best things in life aren't things."

He has a son who is now 3 and definitely sees life differently as a father.

I know things aren't all that important, and I struggle with the consumerism of Christmas, but I do enjoy choosing gifts for people I love. It gives you a moment to focus on the individual characteristics of that person in your life, to celebrate the things that make him or her special and to appreciate the unique role that person plays in your life. That has become a big part of the season's joy for me. Giving gifts makes me happy.

The past two weeks, I had the opportunity to eavesdrop on some families who were doing just that for their children, and it was pure joy.

First Baptist Church, in its service to Abilene families through GLO Daycare, City Light – an outreach to the working poor and homeless, and a longstanding partnership with Martinez Elementary, has each Christmas helped folks in the traditional way; buying and delivering requested gifts to referred families. This year, FBC revamped its Christmas contributions and with members' donations of brand new toys and literally thousands of dollars, transformed the City Light meeting room into a well-stocked toy store, playing host to the magic of the holiday season. And as a partner, we got to participate. We were also able to connect our generous sponsor, Hendrick Health System, to the Christmas store as well.

So, rather than the philanthropic church folks' hearts being warmed by the smiles of delight on the cherubic faces of Christmas children, the hearts of Mom, Dad, Grandma, and Grandpa will be. And the joy began among the shelves of a makeshift showroom on Hickory Street. My favorites were the fathers shopping for their young ones. I guess because the care and tenderness of fathers often gets overlooked these days. The couples shopping together were a close second, because there were gasps and laughter and talk about the merits of their selections – and each of their children – and how or why he or she would love the purchase.

The joy and relief of finding gifts and being able to purchase them for their kids filled the showroom and spilled into the city streets as we loaded their bundles into their cars, and Limagine followed them all the way home.

I know it has followed me for days.
