

## **NEW BEGINNINGS**

2017 was one of the hardest years of my life. I was serving as the pastor of a small church in Illinois. Ever since my calling to ministry I had dreams of being a lead pastor, no matter the size of the church. I finally had my opportunity. There's more to the story as you can imagine, but let's just say it ended up not being a good match. The church could no longer afford to pay me my salary so Katie and I left in October of 2017, just one year after serving as their pastor. I was devastated. I felt myself to be a failure. A dream I had for so long came crashing down causing me to enter into a dark time in my life.

I found myself angry at God. I was angry with the Church, all of them, not just the one I had been pastoring. I began re-examining my call to ministry and even whether or not I wanted to be part of a church ever again. Having grown up loving the Church, my anger turned to deep grief. Church wasn't supposed to be a place where people vied for power. It isn't supposed to be a place where we act like we have everything together and think it's weird when someone shares deep parts of themselves. It isn't supposed to be a place where people come to be served, but to serve. It's not supposed to be about what's in it for me, but what's in it for the whole world, the greatest, and according to Jesus, especially the least of these.

During this time of questioning, anger, and grief, I began interviewing to be the new Pastor for Emerging Adults. Toward the end of the process, Dr. Christopher asked me a question I'll never forget, "With the pain you've experienced because of the church, what makes you want to continue doing ministry in a church." To be honest, if he had asked that question a month earlier, I would have said, "I'm not sure. I guess I'm a glutton for punishment." However, having had time to reflect and process my emotions, I said, "I finally realized that I wouldn't be so angry with something I didn't love so much. And, I want to continue ministering in a church so I can help be part of the solution rather than giving up."

Since you're reading this and in case you didn't know, I got the job ③, and it's been a great new beginning. Working at FBC was a welcomed fresh start for me. One which came with excitement and energy, but also one which came with some anxiety and fear of the unknown. All new beginnings have that tension. We never know what we are getting into. We take the task one day, one person, one situation at a time and before you know it, it's been nine months. I've met people, made friends, and all the facets of newness came true: some fear, frustration, and disappointment, but mainly excitement, energy, and new life.

As I reflect back, I've realized Churches don't always get it right and that's ok. After all, we're human. Also, it should be no surprise that the same thing which hurt me so deeply, a church, is the same place where I've found healing, forgiveness, and a renewed sense of joy for ministry. When the church is who we are called to be, healing, forgiveness, peace, hope, and love are what we have to offer all people. There are many people in our world and our own city who have been hurt by people in a church. It's part of our responsibility as people of God to help them have a new beginning in a different kind of church. I'm so thankful to be at FBC and to have new opportunities to serve the Lord and the Lord's Church.

Whether you've had a good year or a bad one, know God is in the business of making things new. When you have new opportunities this year, trust God is with you and be willing to try it even if it makes you uncomfortable.

#### Learning to Tell Time...

Happy New Year! We encounter all kinds of customs to greet a New Year. Did you have your black-eyed peas for "good luck?" Not sure the source of that idea. Some credit the innovation of "New Year's Resolutions" to the ancient Babylonians. Their most popular resolution: "returning farm equipment." Sure beats losing weight or getting organized.

I have tried the resolution route, or rut, with little success. I usually break half of them by the first quarter of the Sugar Bowl on January 1. What we need more than *"Resolutions,"* which we work so hard to keep by human will-power, is a *"Revolution"* which comes through the power of God's grace.

Yet, how can that kind of radical transformation become a reality? This past Sunday, we heard about a life-changing pathway to pursue in the book of Ecclesiastes: *"There is a suitable time for everything,* and a season for everything under the heavens." In Hebrew, *"season"* means there is an appointed time <u>when action</u> It is time to ask: **"WHAT SEASON IS IT IN MY LIFE?"** 

God has an appointed time for you this year to take action.

In Chapter 3, verses 1-8, Ecclesiastes sets out fourteen contrasting times we will inevitably face. There will be an appointed time for one and <u>not the other</u> in our lives based on what time or season it is in our lives. It will be a time for that *"suitable"* action or tragically, the opportunity will be lost. You have an appointed time this year. Musicians know you can play the right note at the wrong time which still makes it the wrong note.

> It is time to ask: "What season is it in my life?" God has an appointed time for you this year to take action.

> Take for example, "There is a time to keep and a time to throw away." There are things worth keeping. Perhaps things are good for you right now. While everything is OK, don't borrow trouble by worrying about tomorrow. Keep this time of joy. There are things vou cannot control, but don't let those uncertainties rob you of the joy of this time. You might even want to keep the remnants of pain since pain is our great teacher. But perhaps you are keeping too much. What you are keeping has become stale, unsatisfying, or even destructive. It might be time for you to unload the guilt, regret, or the idea everything is up to

<u>must be taken or the opportunity lost.</u> Ecclesiastes calls us to ask at a New Year: "What time or season is it in my life?" This revolutionary question becomes the dominant doorway to enter a New Year. Even though we have free choice, God has set an appointed time for you which doesn't come from a calendar, but the very hands of God. As scripture says, "Our times are in His hands."

you. As you search these seasons keep asking: "What time or season is it in my life?" Also, trust no matter what...*"In His time He will make all things beautiful.*"

he died as a martyr for his faith in Christ. His moving testimony clearly shows he knew what time or season it was in his life.

"I'm part of the fellowship of the unashamed. I have the Holy Spirit's power. The die has been cast. I have stepped over the line. The decision has been made -- I'm a disciple of His. I won't look back, let up, slow down, back away, or be still. My past is redeemed, my present makes sense, my future is secure. I'm finished and done with low living, sight walking, smooth knees, colorless dreams, tamed visions, worldly talking, cheap giving, and dwarfed goals.

I no longer need preeminence, prosperity, position, promotions, plaudits, or popularity. I don't have to be right, first, tops, recognized, praised, regarded, or rewarded. I now live by faith, lean in his presence, walk by patience, am uplifted by prayer, and I labor with power.

My face is set, my gait is fast, my goal is heaven, my road is narrow, my way rough, my companions few, my Guide reliable, my mission clear. I cannot be bought, compromised, detoured, lured away, turned back, deluded, or delayed. I will not flinch in the face of sacrifices, hesitate in the presence of the enemy, pander at the pool of popularity, or meander in the maze of mediocrity.

I won't give up, shut up, let up, until I have stayed up, stored up, prayed up, paid up, preached up for the cause of Christ. I am a disciple of Jesus. I must go till He comes, give till I drop, preach till all know, and work till He stops me. And, when He comes for His own, He will have no problem recognizing me...my banner will be clear." #### **STAFF UPDATES** by Mike Greenfield

There have been a few changes to the staff over the past several weeks and wanted you to be aware of the changes and where we are in the process of filling some open positions.

The Pastor for Students Search Committee is hard at work and they have reviewed over 40 resumes and have narrowed their focus to several of those resumes and are in the process of getting more information through the means of some written answers to some challenging questions.

Over the past several weeks, the Pastor for Senior Adults Search Committee has been meeting and have some information they would like to share with the church. In cooperation with the Personnel Committee and Pastoral Staff, and then seriously looking at the church budget and current staffing, the search committee is moving forward with the following:

C.V. Blake (who approached the staff with this desire) will assume responsibility for the overall leadership of the Senior Adult Ministry and the church will seek to fill a part-time position (25-29 hours per week) which will focus on pastoral care. The job description will include:

- Lead in planning, conducting, and evaluating a comprehensive program of pastoral care to the members who are in care facilities, nursing homes, homebound, and in the hospitals

- Be a consistent presence in the various facilities and homes of those in this ministry group. Work with the Pastor for Adults in developing a support ministry for the care givers of those in this ministry group

- Provide counsel for those in need when appropriate

- Work with the pastoral team in developing intergenerational activities which would incorporate this age group with all other age groups in the church

- Develop a strategy to keep the members of this ministry group before the church
- Plan appropriate activities for those in this ministry group
- Serve as staff liaison with the hospital visitation team
- Work with the deacons in coordinating communion with those who are not able to attend church.

If you know of someone who would be a fit for this position, please have them submit a resume to Mike Greenfield (mike.greenfield@fbcabilene.org). The committee would like to begin interviewing beginning the first of the year. A complete job description is available on the church website in the Media/forms sections.

Around the office, we are excited to have David Curry join the staff as the Ministry Assistant for Finance. Most of you see David on Sunday mornings as he plays guitar in the Celebration Orchestra. He brings more than a musical flair to the job, as he has an accounting degree and banking background. So, next time you are in the office, drop by and welcome David to the staff.
