During the weeks of Sunday school this fall, I was leading a study on the book *Half-Truths: God Helps Those Who Help Themselves and Other Things the Bible Doesn't Say* by Adam Hamilton. In it he addresses the phrase, "God won't give you more than you can handle."

This half-truth is based on 1 Corinthians 10:13 which says, "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and He will not let you be tested beyond our own strength, but with the testing He will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it." The reason the phrase doesn't fit the scripture is because Paul is writing specifically about temptation, not all life circumstances.

Another reason the phrase "God won't give you more than you can handle" is a half-truth is because it implies God gives us all the bad things we experience in our lives. That isn't the way God works. God knows about them and is with us through them, but God doesn't cause them or give them to us to see how much we can endure and then pull off right before our breaking point.

Hamilton writes, "It's not that God won't give you more than you can handle, but that God will help you handle all that you've been given." 2020 has given us a whole lot of pain, heartache, and loss. We've had to learn completely new ways of living and being in our world. I feel confident in saying, "2020 has given us more than we can handle...on our own."

The Bible is full of stories of people who experienced more than they can handle. When we experience difficult times, it's important to remember God uses others to help and encourage us. Moses had Aaron. David had Jonathan. The disciples had each other. Jesus sent out His followers in pairs.

One, of many, lessons learned in 2020 is that we don't have to live life on our own. It's ok to ask for help. We must not buy into the lie that individualism is a sign of ultimate strength, especially for the Christ-follower. Acts 4:32 says, "All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had."

Think of a burden you've been trying to handle on your own. Commit to sharing that burden with a trusted friend so you don't have to carry the weight of it alone. Now, think of a person you know who may be experiencing a tough time. What do you have you can share with them? Time, money, encouragement, or maybe a free babysitting coupon for the parents who need a break.

In our lives, we will most certainly experience more than we can handle. As we enter into 2021, I pray we will embrace the importance of relying on one another – as a church, as families, as individuals. We may be able to survive on our own, but it is only together that we can thrive. May the hope of our Lord Jesus Christ give you strength to persevere.
