As we celebrate the birthday of our country on July 4, we seem to be a country more divided than ever. We dig into political positions which polarize us like border security, which I know is a complex issue. I certainly don't have all of the answers.

I have been searching for ways the Church can respond as followers of Jesus to unify, recognizing we are first citizens of the kingdom.

Relating to the recent events on the Texas border, we hear the words of Jesus about children: "Anyone who welcomes them welcomes me...but if anyone causes them to stumble, it would be better for him to have a huge milestone hung around his neck and be thrown into the sea." Deuteronomy says, "Do not be hardhearted toward the poor, but be open handed. There will always be poor. (But we forget the rest of the passage that says) Therefore I command you to be openhanded toward the needy."

In the midst of these challenging and controversial times, I want to offer a word of hope which goes beyond politics to profiles in courage. This hope comes in the story of one who faced the greatest division in our country's history. I pray this story from the past will give you hope for the future.

Here is the story of the person in our country's history who brought a divided nation together with compassion. He was the 16th President, Abraham Lincoln. When elected, Lincoln was considered a hillbilly joke. During those dark days of the Civil War, he was unmercifully attacked by all sides. The sensitive Lincoln was wounded by his critics. Yet, his presidency became a spiritual journey of a divine calling to bring a nation together. Lincoln was attacked by critics, suffered great personal tragedy, and finally was assassinated. But, he was a giant of reconciliation and leaves a legacy of building bridges of understanding.

Lincoln was painted as a pagan. Yet, Elton Trueblood reports he was immersed in Holy Scripture. He knew by heart most of the Psalms, the book of Isaiah, and the New Testament. According to Trueblood, the Bible not only influenced the content of his speeches, but the style of his addresses. Of the 265 words of the Gettysburg Address, 194 of the words are one syllable. Similarly, the 23rd Psalm, one of Lincoln's favorites, has 118 words, and 92 of those words are one syllable. Lincoln just didn't quote scripture when it was expedient, convenient, or served his own political ends. Instead, Biblical language was so deeply embedded in his thinking and life it became a normal way of speaking and acting....

One historian points out, Lincoln could hold a moral position without the usual self-righteousness and posturing of politicians of today. A minister from the North announced during the Civil War that the "Lord was on their side." Lincoln responded, "I'm not as concerned about whether or not God is on our side. I want to know how I can get on God's side."

In Lincoln's "Second Inaugural Address" we see his faith at its deepest. On this occasion in 1865 at the end of the hostility, the war had claimed 620,000 lives of brothers against brothers. The address was only seven minutes long and consisted of 701 words. His speech has been called one of the greatest, and a theological classic. The crowd came hoping Lincoln would give voice to their anger and hate for the South and all of the losses. Yet, instead of demonizing the South, Lincoln asked: "How can we bring the South back into the Union and offer forgiveness?"

Dr. Allen McSween has written, "Lincoln refused to divide the country – or human beings in general into those who are good and those who are evil. Lincoln knew that the line between goodness and evil runs not between contending parties, controversial positions, or nations, but through the dark hearts of every last one of us."

Lincoln ended his last inaugural address with the words: "With malice toward none; with charity toward all...let us bind up the nations wounds...." Lincoln died at 7:22 a.m. on April 15, 1865. When he breathed his last breath, it was said, "He now belongs to the ages." Of all things, Lincoln died on Good Friday. His crime? "Malice toward none and charity toward all."

Lincoln has the magnificent memorial in Washington as he sits in that chair of honor which overlooks the city and our nation. I wonder if we look closely, might we see a tear in his eye because we have forgotten his words of hope and reconciliation: "With malice toward none; with charity toward all." Those words have made America great. Let us celebrate the fourth with hope.

#### CITY LIGHT RE-VISION UPDATE: NOURISHKC By John Moore

A team of four people from FBC consisting of: Karen Dansby, Lynn Martin, Hillary Moore, and myself, served 330 restaurant style lunch plates to those who were hungry in Kansas City, Missouri. Our service started with the evening prep team deboning chicken, washing fresh salad, and cleaning the kitchen. All of these items were considered "food rescue," which is food that was going to be thrown away, and this food supplied the many meals prepared that week. Three hours of deboning chicken will make you appreciate what it takes to run a kitchen like this, which is very similar to our City Light kitchen. Our Tuesday morning started at 8:30 a.m. preparing for the 11:00 a.m. lunch to start. Some of our deboned chicken became the stock for our chicken noodle soup. Our menu also included: pasta and meat sauce for entrée one, and soft taco Tuesday with a fresh corn salsa or black bean medley for entrée two. Fresh salad and fruit topped off the meal. The lunch shift serves from 11:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., and 330 plates later, we stopped for our own lunch. We were joined by 15 volunteers from a local bank who served as our waiters, hostesses, and bussers for each table. Guests were greeted with a friendly face, then seated to have their order taken and filled by the plating station. Our servers brought the smiles, prayers, and encouragement to all who were hungry. After lunch, we spent the next four hours talking and asking questions with the NourishKC staff, who were so generous with their time. We left tired, but affirmed in our calling to live out our Re-vision plans here in Abilene. The only thing lasked Lynn was to not debone any chicken in Abilene for at least a week!

As we served at NourishKC, we were:

- Encouraged we are on the right track, as City Light is already doing ministry similar to NourishKC
- Grateful to see the job training center, while meeting with the director and trainees to hear about their program
- Challenged by their great organization in volunteer development, and getting the most of their "food rescue" system
- Humbled by the love they have for the "least of these" and their willingness to invest meaningful and valuable time to strangers from Texas.

FBC Abilene, we are on the right path and God is moving in our re-visioning process. Be in prayer as we meet with Catalyst Kitchens July 10 and 11 at City Light. Thank you for being a church who cares.
