## **JUNE 2021**

Last Sunday was Pentecost, which gives us great hope for the future as we emerge from the days of COVID-19 and all of the changes. Pentecost arrived ten days after Jesus returned to the Father. The disciples were down to eleven. The future of the Jesus movement seemed so uncertain. A small group of followers were gathered in an upstairs room not knowing the next step. But, they *"were joined together constantly in prayer."* I ask, *"Have we been constantly praying? That is always the prelude to the pouring out of God's power."* 

You've heard the story of the rushing wind and the tongues of fire, but we can still wonder what is exactly the *"gift of Pentecost."* We could describe the gift as energy and excitement. God knows we need it. Some could focus on the power. God knows we need power.

Tom Long observes, "The gift of Pentecost is the one gift we most desperately need and especially this world and the church." The gift is not the superficial power of a five-hour energy drink or a shot of spiritual adrenaline in worship. The gift of Pentecost is the gift to speak a "Word" in this broken world <u>unlike any other</u> word. People from all over the world understood the "Good News of Jesus" in their own language. Could we dare say Pentecost gives a common language where we start understanding EACH OTHER?

Dr. Long tells two wonderful stories which help us understand the gift of Pentecost. He first shares when Dr. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross was writing her book on death and dying, part of her research involved interviewing dying patients in the hospital trying to find out how they felt and thought as they faced death. As she went from room to room in the hospital, she began to notice a remarkable pattern. Sometimes she would go into a dying person's room and the person would be calm, at peace, and tranquil. She also began to notice this pattern after the patient's room had been cleaned by a certain hospital orderly. One day, Dr. Ross happened to run into this orderly and said: *"What are you doing with* 

### my patients?"

The orderly thought she was being reprimanded and said, "I'm not doing anything with your patients." "No, no," responded Dr. Ross. "It's a good thing. After you go into their rooms, they seem at peace. What are you doing with my patients?"

"I just talk to them," the orderly said. "You know, I've had two babies of my own die on my lap. But God never abandoned me. I tell them that. I tell them that they aren't alone, that God is with them, and that they don't have to be afraid." There's the gift at Pentecost: A Word to speak in the brokenness and tragedy of the world, a word of good news and hope that is unlike any other word.

The second story is about a personal experience when Tom was a brand-new pastor and here is that story.

I announced to my congregation one Sunday, "Next Sunday morning I'm going to start a pastor's class on the basics of the Christian faith. If you are new to the faith, I invite you to join me next Sunday at ten."

The next week, I went to my classroom expecting to greet a throng, and I was immediately disappointed. There were only three elementary school children, three little girls, waiting on me. I tried to hide my disappointment and over the next few weeks to do the best I could to teach them about the Christian faith. The week before Pentecost Sunday, I said to them, "Do you girls know what Pentecost is?"

They didn't. So, I said, "Well, Pentecost was when the church was seated in a circle and tongues of fire came down from heaven and landed on their heads and they spoke the gospel in all the languages of the world."

Two of the little girls took that rather calmly, but one of them got her eyes as big as saucers. And when she could finally speak, she said, "Reverend Long, we must have been absent that Sunday!"

The beautiful thing about that is <u>not</u> that she misunderstood. The beautiful thing is that she thought it could have happened in our church, that God's Spirit could have come even to our little congregation and given us a word to speak that the world desperately needs to hear.

Perhaps the question of Pentecost is what healing word will we speak to the brokenness of this world AND to each other? God knows we need the healing word of Pentecost where we start looking to understand each other.

# **GIVE HOPE UPDATE**

This is a very exciting time in the life of our church as we begin to actually see each other in person after so many months of worshipping and meeting by Zoom or other methods. We, as a committee, are so thankful for your continued prayer and financial support to the Hope Center projects. While we have been limited by being unable to meet in person, we have still been able to make progress on plans for the Hope Center campus.

Through your faithful giving we have received \$4,067,706.00 on pledges in excess of \$5,900,000.00. Expenditures to date total \$166,435.00. These gifts speak of the love and compassion First Baptist Church people have for the outreach ministries of our church. These gifts are currently invested through HighGround Advisors so we can gain some income while we are in the design process.

The first of April we completed renovation work in the Perry Building (BOBS) and the décor and furnishings are now being completed. We have renovated the third-floor restrooms to be ADA compliant as well as installing new ceilings, carpet, vinyl base, and paint on the 2nd floor for the expansion of the Ministry of Counseling. Eric Couvion and his staff have been instrumental in making this happen as they installed new lighting, computer lines, toilet accessories, and assembled furniture for the entire project.


Design of the City Light ministry project is nearing The building committee, along with completion. members of the City Light board, have spent a great deal of time determining the needs of the City Light ministry in order to create the most efficient facility possible. Several construction options were considered before determining that additions on the east and west end of the existing activity building would best meet our needs. By expanding east/west we are able to preserve the parking lot that is south of the existing activity building for use as a drop off zone/parking area for GLO as well as a parking area for the Ministry of Counseling and future tenants in the Perry Building. The main entrance for City Light clients will be located on the northeast corner of the building. We have designed two large lobbies that clients will be able to use while waiting to use the showers or to meet with a counselor. This area will also serve as an indoor waiting room for entry into the dining room. The dining room will enable us to seat approximately 180 during meal times which is more than double the existing City Light dining room capacity. The commercial kitchen space will not only be used to prepare meals for City Light, but will also serve as a training area for the Culinary Academy. Classroom space is also provided

adjacent to the kitchen for training students. Our City Light volunteers will have an entrance area on the east end of the building where they can prepare to serve and then move into the kitchen through the office corridors.

The GLO ministry project continues to also be under study. We have preliminary design drawings that are based on input from the GLO board and Allie Workman. The new GLO facility will expand the capacity of GLO to meet the needs of more than 180 children which is nearly double the number we are currently licensed for. The new GLO facility will occupy the first floor of the existing children's education building which will house office space and infants. The second floor can be developed for after-school programs at a later date. The existing sanctuary will be converted into classroom space for toddlers and the existing chapel will become a multipurpose space for worship or indoor play. The current office/library area may become a kitchen and dining room. Our hope is to include an entry foyer in the center of the space which will allow entry from the East or West for check-in as well as indoor play. Again, these plans are still in the design phase, but this is the general direction we are going.

In light of current construction cost increases, we have instructed the architect and contractors to take the drawings we currently have and come up with new cost estimates for the Hope Center. Once we see those estimates we will have a better understanding of where we are in regard to our budget. Our charge is to construct and pay for these projects as funding comes in. In light of that, we are timing our work to coincide with our giving. Please continue to be in prayer for the building committee's wisdom in the days ahead as we seek to serve God in this wonderful ministry opportunity.





Initial drawings for City Light Community Ministries utilizing the gym and adding on to it.


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Initial drawings for GLO utilizing the existing children's building, sanctuary, chapel and office areas.
