#### A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

Thank you for your ongoing support of the Pastor Search Committee and your generous participation in three community conversations and two individual surveys. In this time of pastoral transition, we are winding down the first phase of our work together, a congregational "self-study." In order to know what sort of Senior Pastor we need, we first must ask what sort of church we are, and where we think God is leading us in the future. In our three Congregational Conversations, we have come together as a church community to discuss the important issues of our identity and calling. The dialogue has been very fruitful, resulting in clear statements of our values from the first conversation, concrete directions in which to focus our energy from the second conversation, and a sense of our trajectory, or where we think we need to go, from our third conversation. In addition to these three big conversations, we have asked you to participate in two surveys: one about our convictions as a church, and one about our next pastor.

To summarize the results from our first Congregational Conversation, where we talked about what we value most about our church, we said that First Baptist is a:

- 1. Welcoming community who values authentic relationships.
- 2. Missional community who values outwardly-focused service.
- 3. Spiritual community who values intergenerational, lifelong formation.
- 4. Worshipping community who values depth and reverence in music and word.
- 5. Traditional community who values heritage, innovation, and progress. (To review fuller statements of these values, go to the February First Words, or click here: *February First Words*.)



From our second Congregational Conversation, the most commonly discussed items about where we are focusing or need to focus the energy of our church, we said the following.

With regard to the Mirror view (looking inwardly), we said that:

- 1. Our senior membership is emblematic of our rich heritage, and we hope to increase engagement of younger generations.
- 2. While we are concerned about a decline in Sunday morning attendance, we have maintained numbers fairly well through the pandemic, and we hope to grow in the future.
- 3. The well-balanced budget of our church reflects our heart for missions by prioritizing externally-focused ministries.
- 4. The people of FBC are generous in their giving, especially in the senior adult area, and we hope to encourage more generosity among younger adults.

With regard to the Window view (looking outwardly), we said that:

- 1. Community ministries, such as City Light, GLO, FLC, and Ministry of Counseling, are hallmarks of our church's significant imprint in Abilene and the Big Country.
- 2. Our community has a relatively high number of households made up of singles, adults without children, and single moms, and we hope to increase our engagement with them.
- 3. FBC media ministry reaches many well beyond our church walls and can provide a springboard for even more creative engagement in this arena.
- 4. While City Light Community Ministries serves a diverse population, we would like for the rest of our congregation to reflect more of the ethnic, economic, and overall diversity of our city.

Between the first and second Congregational Conversations, we also participated in a survey of the convictions of our church, related primarily to theological matters, but also to broad cultural and political issues. The purpose of the survey was to gauge where our church stands on a spectrum of conservative, moderate, and progressive perspectives. The survey showed that we have folks in our church who hold convictions at all points of the spectrum, but the average of respondents indicates that we are a "center right" church, with most of us being on the line between conservative and moderate. The survey also indicated that as a congregation we value relationships with folks who have different perspectives from us, and we are open to leadership from a Senior Pastor whose perspectives are somewhat different from our own. Because 403 of us were willing to engage in this survey, we have some very helpful data to share with a future pastor about our convictions as a church and our openness to perspectives different from our own.

Our third and final Congregational Conversation occurred on February 27. Thank you for your generous involvement in the table dialogue, which produced a lot of helpful information about the trajectory of our church, focusing on where we see God leading us and what we imagine our future Senior Pastor will need to do and be. That conversation was immediately followed by a second survey concerning our future pastor. We are asking everyone in the congregation to take the Next Pastor Survey, which will be available until March 10. A link to the survey was sent out in an email from our interim pastor's organization. If you haven't seen it yet, look for an email from <code>Mattc@chchurches.org</code>. The emailed survey link can only be used once (and it can't be forwarded to anyone else for use), so each person in your family will need to provide the church office with an individual email to receive the survey. Most of us have already worked out individual email addresses in connection with our first survey. However, if you do not receive the Next Pastor Survey or have any trouble with it, contact Debra Clemmer in the church office at (325) 675-8116 or <code>debra.clemmer@fbcabilene.org</code>. The survey typically takes about ten minutes to complete, and we hope that all youth and adults in the church will complete it. As a committee, we are eager to hear your individual thinking about the sort of Senior Pastor our church needs.

Over the next 6-8 weeks the Pastor Search Committee will move into a less visible phase, as we are analyzing the data from the third conversation and the second survey. From all the data collected, we will develop two important documents: a Church Profile, which describes the nature and vision of our church, and a Senior Pastor Profile, which broadly describes the sort of leader our church needs in the future. Please pray for us in this analysis and writing phase of our work, that we will have the gift of spiritual discernment as we listen for God's direction. When this self-study phase is completed, we will share our work with the congregation and move into the search phase, where we are actively seeking the person whom we will recommend to the church as our next Senior Pastor.

Healing Hearts Ministry officially began their 10th year of ministry in September, but due to unforeseen circumstances, meetings were postponed until Thursday, February 17. I was so delighted to see everyone who was able to attend that meeting.

For those of you who don't know about this ministry, Healing Hearts Ministry is a Prayer Shawl Ministry in which members create and make tangible items such as shawls, throws, "no-sew" fleece blankets, angels, and prayer cloths to give to people who need prayer, as a reminder that prayers are being lifted up for them. We also make hats for City Light Community Ministries to keep the "homeless" warm during bad weather.

There are several jobs in this ministry which don't require crocheting or knitting ability. One of those is the "nosew" fleece blankets. In the near future, we are planning on having a "workshop" for making these blankets. It is possible that one person could cut the strips for the blanket, and a different person could pull the strips

Another way to serve in Healing Hearts Ministry is as a courier who delivers the gifts which are going to those in need of prayer. These people are very important to our ministry because of the personal encouragement they offer when delivering the gifts.

Our meetings will be held on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of each month in Room 6 of University Place from 3:00 to 4:30 p.m. There is also the opportunity to come to a "knit along" on the 2nd Thursday of the month during which time we will work on knitting, crocheting, or cutting out "no-sew" fleece blankets. It is possible we could extend this to a 4th Thursday, if there is enough interest.
