THE SIX-YEAR HISTORY OF THE RE-VISIONING PLAN - Community Transformation

City Light Re-Visioning Plan Vote *May 13, 2018 after the morning worship service. (*Please note the date change)

City Light Community Ministries became a reality in April 1997 through the ministry of David Leyerle and a church committed to serving everybody in our city. A newly remodeled facility in June of 2001 allowed FBC to bring Good News to anybody who entered our doors. Seventeen years later, the church is prayerfully seeking the leadership of our Heavenly Father to re-vision our philosophy of ministry, address our aging building and equipment, and develop new strategies for ministry which moves from enabling to transformation. The original long-term strategic plan of City Light, which dates back to 1997, called for the ministry to one day include and adopt the objectives which are a part of the Re-visioning Plan and Five Pillars. The Re-visioning Plan is really not something new, but was always a part of the original vision and strategy developed by David Leyerle, our first Missions Pastor.

CLCM WILL FOCUS ON FIVE PILLARS OF FOCUS:

- 1 DINING WITH DIGNITY- To offer hospitality to a stranger as if they were family
- **2 COMMUNITY** To do life together as family for all who enter our doors
- **3 LEADERSHIP TRAINING & JOB PLACEMENT** To provide life changes for families through training and opportunity
- 4 CASE MANAGEMENT & PAYEE MANAGEMENT To break family cycles of poverty and homelessness together
- **5 EDUCATION/LITERACY/COLLABORATION** Working together to change poverty's effect on families in our community.

Over six years ago, conversations began with the Missions Committee and City Light leaders led by Ken Lyle, Sr. about the ministry model of City Light. Dr. Lyle put in countless hours bringing together our current practice and emerging methodology of becoming less toxic and dependency creating. This dream was included from the very start in our "Reflection and Direction" discernment process and was a major way that we as a church "Act In Love." Our deacons were updated and made suggestions to the plan in May 2016 and these changes were shown and talked about in our

We believe with the new north entrance, the church campus will be safer. The plan will even help downtown businesses in providing a place for people to not just hang out, but to find direction and discover life skills for their lives.

I have lived in Abilene longer than anywhere else. I love this place and people. I enjoy looking at the history of our city and church. Here are a few historical markers. In January 1881, the Texas Pacific Railway tracks reached mile marker 407, the site that would become Abilene. Today the exact spot is Everman Park in downtown. In March 1881, Abilene was founded, and an auction was held to sell lots. In two days, 178 lots were sold to people who invested in the future of this prairie stop on the T&P railway which was just Mesquite trees and cactus.

On December 17, 1881, twelve people met in a house on Cedar Street and organized First Baptist. The church planter, O. C. Pope said as he rode out of town on horseback, "I wonder if anything will ever come of this?" I hope Dr. Pope has a view from heaven of our church today and what God has done from the tiny seed he planted on that rainy day. The miracles God can do if we will trust in His plan.

Here is another important date for our church and Abilene. In April 1997, City Light Community Ministries opened its doors after purchasing and renovating an abandoned bank building. This mission emerged from the vision and the call of Jesus to care for the "least of these."

Some had concerns about how the budget could fund the added cost of City Light. Yet, God has provided. The ministry has thrived in helping with electric bills, rent, or bus passes to get someone to a job interview. We will serve 36,000 meals this year. When I was at City Light on Wednesday, it was like church. Our brothers and sisters at City Light feel connected to us and have lessons to teach us about gratitude, perseverance, humility, and trust.

On May 13, we have the opportunity to take a giant step in community transformation with the *Re-visioning Plan*. We will not just help with emergencies or crises. We will empower people to move out of poverty through job training and personal case management. They will discover a new dignity in the expanded dining facility and take on the responsibilities of serving.

The Re-visioning Plan for City Light will NOT take funds away from other ministries in the budget. Our Missions Endowment spins off over \$100,000 a year that can be used. We have already been in conversations with several foundations that expressed excitement in our plan. As this innovative ministry becomes a reality, we believe others will want to join us. I am in the process of having conversations with community leaders who already see the potential of our plan for downtown.

Funding this ministry will not be a financial burden on our children. I understand you want the best for your children and their future. Think...they will have the blessing and not a burden of impacting lives for the Kingdom – what a gift we will give them. As God has blessed us with abundant resources, God will continue to provide. I am grateful my daughter grew up in a church who was not inwardly focused or driven by the fear of not having enough. I give thanks our church taught Natalie to see what the church is called to be and do. This plan will teach our children that the church is about serving. They will see the Bible stories they hear in Sunday school put into action.

On May 13, I pray we will establish another important date in the history of our church. I wonder what will be said of us fifty years from now. Like those first pioneers in 1881, who bought lots in a town that didn't exist, I invite you to invest in this plan and trust "God is able to do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine." As those pioneers purchased lots to build Abilene, churches, and schools, let us build the Kingdom and transform our community as we "seek the welfare of the city." Remember, "To whom much is given, much is expected."



City Light open house. City Light leadership, which included Karen Dansby, Diane Leggett, Wayne Roy, Susan Pigeon, Dr. Bob Ellis, Will Rogers, Maura dela Cruz, Lynn Martin, John Moore, and Dr. Phil Christopher, invested long hours into studying how we use our building and how it will be used in the future. An update for the re-visioning plan from the study group was again taken to the deacon body over a year ago. Suggestions were made for modifications by the deacons, which were made. After years of studying the need to move City Light from dependency to self-sufficiency, the church formally elected the study group as the Special Focus Committee on December 3, 2017. The Committee consists of Karen Dansby, Diane Leggett, Wayne Roy, Susan Pigeon, Hillary Moore, Dr. Bob Ellis, Will Rogers, Maura dela Cruz, Lynn Martin, John Moore, and Dr. Phil Christopher. This Focus Committee was to recommend to the Missions Committee, after intense study, how to move forward in development and implementation. An information brochure was designed for the church to explain the Re-Visioning Plan and made available to all members. The plan was taken to the deacon body in March and was discussed again at the April meeting. *All along, the process the desire for this Re-vision committee has been to plan, rework, listen, and communicate the vision, which has led us to allowing for an extra time of discussion. This Sunday, May 6, at 5 p.m. in the dining room, our congregation will have another opportunity to discuss this important mission of the church. This will be a special called church conference.

On Sunday May 13, the Missions Committee (Ken Lyle, Jr., Prudy Tyler, Ruth Anna Driggers, Barbara Darnall, Marci Cole, Dave Irwin, Louise Gray, Barry Moak, Jean Goodnight, Will Rogers, Jecilly Varghese, Martha Brown, Diane Leggett, and John Moore), and the Special Focus Committee will bring the following recommendation: *To initiate a capital campaign to begin in the fall of 2018 called, "Seeking the Welfare of the City" and to raise \$2.8 million for transforming the ministry of City Light to empower people and transform downtown.* Please join us in prayer for this important ballot vote without discussion on May 13 after the morning worship service. A "yes" vote does not mean construction begins. It gives us the opportunity to initiate a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds for funding the Re-visioning Plan. Depending on the funding, any changes will be brought back to the church.

This plan has been presented to various Sunday school classes, deacon body, town hall meetings, and proclaimed in worship two different Sundays. Please contact the missions' office (325-675-8112) if you have further questions.

BALI EXPERIENCES

For the last seven months, I was in Bali partnering with CBF field personnel, Jonathan and Tina Bailey, to write about spirituality and the arts, which are two concepts that are intertwined through every aspect of daily Balinese life. Beyond the local community, I spent a lot of time with two other groups of people: a group of international students who came to Bali from all walks of life to learn about the rich, artistic culture and a group of inmates in Kerobokan prison who I met with for a rehabilitative art program.

From January to March of this year a group of locals, international students, and expatriates met daily to rehearse a music project which explored Balinese cosmology and portrayed the link between our material world and the divine. It is a story that honestly portrays struggle, hope, and God in the midst of each. The music had several points of chaos, which often occurred in places of conflict in the story. But sometimes, there seemed to be chaos simply for the sake of chaos. Eventually the chaotic noise faded away until all that was left was a quiet melody that I didn't notice in the midst of the disorder. I realized this melody was not new to me, but rather familiar because it was there all along. But it took the chaos for me to recognize it.

There were 45 performers involved in this project. Together we represented 18 different nationalities and various ethnicities, languages, religious backgrounds, and beliefs. With so many diverse people in one space, when we gathered it was often nothing short of chaos. But as we sat together to eat and talk about things we agreed on and things we didn't agree on, I always saw how beautiful our diverse chaos was.

A few weeks ago while visiting the prison, one man was painting messy lines and colors onto a canvas. When I saw this technique, I wasn't surprised as this particular man often created abstract and structural pieces. However, in the middle of this chaos was a picture of multiethnic hands clasping one another in a circle. He told me the title was Love. In the midst of a place of misfortunes and mistakes, I saw so much hope and earnest attempts of reform. The men often talk about what they want to do once they leave prison. They have normal dreams like getting a job and starting a family, but sometimes they talk about their big dreams of peace and hope that one day we can all clasp arms with people who are different from us even in the midst of the chaos of the world.

In Bali I learned that beauty and truth often hide in chaos waiting for someone to hear, see, and seek it. I've recently arrived back to the States, and I'm most struck by how orderly things are here. And as frustrating as it often was in Bali for events to begin hours after they are meant to, I wonder what beautiful interruptions we are missing by organizing the chaos. I'm reminded of the ministry of Jesus who stopped to notice the woman who touched His cloak through the chaos in the crowd. We believe in a Messiah who pauses to address the arms that reach out from the chaos of daily life. May we also notice the arms that reach toward us and clasp them with compassion.

I am so grateful to First Baptist Church, the church I grew up in, for teaching me what it means to love God and to love people. I believe that God is doing beautiful and chaotic things in Bali, and I thank each of you for being a part of it.

"What is an emerging adult anyway?" This is often the response I get when I tell people I'm a pastor to emerging adults. In fact, many in our own church have asked that question, and it's a good one. My response is typically, "By First Baptist's definition emerging adults are people ages 18-29, but hopefully we are all emerging in some way." This typically gets a little chuckle and the conversation ends or moves to the next topic, but today, I want to continue the conversation.

Emerging adults, the age group, are a diverse group of people. Some are students in college, college-aged students who are working, people in their first careers, some single, and some married. Emerging adults are people who are breaking forth into new territory: new friends, new relationships, new challenges, new responsibilities, and new opportunities. The goal for our group is to explore new ways of experiencing the way of Christ as they encounter these new phases in life.

In Colossians 2:6-7 Paul writes, "So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness." In my mind, this is the definition of an emerging adult and my vision for our group. I want all people to receive Christ and also understand that receiving Christ Jesus as Lord is not the end of our faith journey, but the beginning. As we grow as humans, physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually, we are continually emerging into who God has created us to be.

No matter your age, I ask you the question, what aspect of your life is emerging? How are you growing and strengthening the faith you were taught. It is important that we continue to mature, not just as adults, but as followers of Christ. To continue living our lives in Him, knowing that discipleship costs us something. Maturing in Christ doesn't only mean we pray and read our Bibles more. It means we continually remember that our lives are not meant to be lived for ourselves, but for others.

What questions are you asking that are taking you deeper in your understanding of and love for God? How are you growing in your understanding of what it means to love your neighbor as yourself, to do unto others as you would have them do unto you? What risks are you taking, even though you know the results are beyond your control?

The way Jesus lived His life shows us a life lived following Him isn't easy, but it's good. My prayer for our Emerging Adult group and for us as a church is that we will all continue to emerge together in the way of Jesus Christ.

Please make a commitment to do everything in your power to help keep this good earth the magnificent and beautiful place God intended. And watch for an announcement about our next big event!




SENIOR JOURNALS
