Campaign for City Light as we consider the feasibility of purchasing First Christian Church. This does not mean our plans and priority for City Light are being abandoned. It was suggested in our Finance Committee meeting we explore all of our options before we renovate and revision City Light. We are still about "crossing the road" to minister to the working poor and marginalized who surround our church.

It is no secret we have received some push back for our plans to revision City Light. I understand their fears, which can control our thoughts and actions. Yet, let me tell you a story about how we have been called to care for the people at our door step in downtown and a well-known couple who was willing to literally "cross the road."

Have you ever been to Magnolia Market at the Silos in Waco, which is the Xanadu of local tourist attractions created by "Fixer Upper" stars Chip and Joanna Gaines? Magnolia attracts over 30,000 people every week from all over the world. Mary and I made our first visit last Saturday. It was remarkable as we weaved our way through the crowd. First Baptist Waco is profiting from the popularity by charging \$10 to park in their lots.

The "Church Under the Bridge" meets underneath the I-35 Bridge near one of the main entrances to Baylor and adjacent to downtown. It is a church and worship for the working poor and homeless where everyone is welcome.

A three-to-five year plan to widen I-35 will begin in March, which will displace the "Church Under the Bridge" and its congregation of the poor. Enter the Gaines. They have invited "Church Under the Bridge" to move to their own magnificent Magnolia Market area. The church of the "least of these" will call this business bonanza their home. Jimmy Dorrell, who shepherds the flock said about the offer to worship at one of Waco's most visible landmarks, "I didn't see this coming..."

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, the despised Samaritan had the courage and compassion to "cross the road" to minister to a wounded Jew, his adversary. The distance might have been measured in feet, but it was like crossing a great divide. I wonder if we have made this story into a pious platitude of being "nice" instead of a radical call to get out of our safe comfort zones. What roads or barriers do you need to cross? Bruce Main, in his book, Why Jesus Crossed the Road, uses this image of the Samaritan's "crossing the road" to reveal what Jesus was about and what we need to be about. Understanding the parable of the Good Samaritan is at the heart of understanding Jesus. Main writes, "At every turn it seemed Jesus crossed impenetrable barriers, borders, and boundaries."

I confess I have faced my own challenges in crossing the road of exclusion. I was uncomfortable when Gary came into the Family Life Center on Round Up Sunday. Gary has profound problems. He can be scary. I thought, here we are on this important Sunday with visitors young families and and Gary, a street person, shows up. Yet, Mike Langford crossed the road to Gary who seems so unlike us. and talked with him as if he mattered, and invited him to lunch.

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Chip Gaines said he considered the risks involved in allowing hundreds of people to gather on the Magnolia lawn on Sundays. He could fear, "what if people from the Bridge showed up on a Saturday." What could this venture do to their business? Megan Henderson, executive director of City Center Waco, which advocates for downtown improvements, applauded the news. Waco City Councilman Dillion Meek, whose district includes the Mission, said he was thrilled Magnolia Market and "Church Under the Bridge" could get together and it was a perfect location for them.

Pastor Dorrell knows that even though Magnolia is closed on Sundays, tourists still flock to take photos. He said, "If extra people show up, for whatever reason, that will be a byproduct of love." He said, "We are here for people who don't feel welcome...." Can you imagine, the homeless and working poor will be welcomed at Magnolia where people are usually pulling out a credit card?

Chip and Joanna Gaines have been willing to "cross the road" like the Good Samaritan and Jesus. More than just "Fixer-Uppers," they are building the kingdom of God right in their own backyard and downtown. Let us never forget, generosity begets generosity. As we prepare for our plans for City Light, let us pray our church, as well as our city, will be willing to "cross the road."

Ronald Martin sees deep faith as more than memorization of the Bible or going to church, but crossing the road. He believes spiritual maturity includes our courage to interface with people unlike us. If we don't see who our neighbor is, we will not see God.

"We were recently asked to train 100+ Ukrainian Christian school teachers.

When asked about the most important problem in their classrooms, the common answers were discipline and authority. The Ukrainian educational system still uses the old Soviet system. It does not value students, practices shaming, and expects authority. During the training, I explained that authority delivers short-term results, but influence goes farther.

We used Jesus' example with the Samaritan woman to show Jesus' focus on building relationships which leads to transformation. At the end of our teaching, unexpectedly, we were thanked with a standing ovation and an outpouring of gifts.

Our FBC Habitat House cleared its last hurdle and was presented and blessed on Saturday, September 22. Congratulations to Bikole & Fubiola Mulanda and their family for taking ownership of this new house. This family of nine, along with many FBC members and community volunteers, put hundreds of hours of sweat equity to build this six bedroom house. Each family member has their own room and a half bathroom was added out of closet space to provide for this large family. This project started in our church Sunday school classes with prayer. Babies and their footprints to senior adults signed 2X4's with messages of prayer, scripture, and hope for this house and family. Those 2X4's were paraded to the sanctuary as the first nail of the project was started by our pastor as an act of worship on a Sunday morning. Then, from the sanctuary the 2x4's were moved to the church parking lot where the framing began for the house. Many FBC volunteers nailed and cut those 2x4's into window frames, door frames, cripples, top plates, bottom plates, bracing, inside walls, and outside walls. When the foundation had cured on Congress street, those walls were moved and reassembled in its new location. From there the house was slowly worked on until it was completed just recently. For a long time this was just a house for the Mulanda family and last Saturday, through prayer, blessing, and dedication this house became a home. A home where a family of nine now resides. A huge thank you goes to FBC and the many volunteers who made this happen. Your financial gifts to the church offering, to Faces and Places, and thousands of man hours have allowed this house to become a new home. There was rejoicing last Saturday at the house blessing and dedication, and you were a part of that joy because you cared enough to help, give, and work.
