THAILAND AND CAMBODIA REPORT

The team is back and excited to share with the church all of the exciting things happening in Southeast Asia. The main purposes of the trip was to be an encourager to the two couples who are serving in Thailand and

Cambodia, see the various ministries they are involved in, and learn how First Baptist can be involved. For Hunter and Mary, being in Thailand for 23 years means they wear many different hats and have seen their ministry evolve to where in many cases they have handed off the work they started to Thai leadership who were ready. However, that means they can now focus on new ventures and challenges as they work in a country which is predominately Buddhist and Muslim. One of their latest ventures is on the island of Phuket where they are working with a Thai couple, Jay and Buu, who have started a children's home and currently have 10 adorable children who have come from some pretty rough backgrounds. We spent two different meals with the children and had the opportunity to hear some of their stories. Jay and Buu have a plan which involves purchasing 5 rai of land (approximately 2 acres) of which they have already purchased 2 of the 5 rai and hope to be able to complete the plot in the coming year and then start

construction on a children's home. We visited the site and prayed over the project and could begin to see in our minds the vision Jay and Buu have. As a church, we possibly will begin to consider further involvement and who knows, maybe a construction team to go and help build the home!

We also traveled to a remote smaller island, accessible only by boat, where we met several different families who Jay and Buu have started a relationship with. This island is 99% Muslim (probably 100%, but they figure there

is at least one person who is not!) and Jay and Buu have been able to share the gospel with several different people, so seed have been planted and they continue to water and tend the soil. Our presence showed the folks that the work Jay and Buu are doing has merit and possibly opened a few mores doors.





Jay and Buu, along with Hunter and Mary, have been teaching English classes at a couple of different locations and so we were able to join in. However, teaching English to senior adults is quite the challenge! The second day of teaching was at a school and we had students from the 4th to the 7th grade. This was a wonderful experience and our work opened up the door for Jay and Buu to be in two other schools!

Our time in Cambodia was a bit more limited both in time and ministry opportunities. David and Lauren Bass, and their fourmonth-old daughter, Chloe, have been on the field for almost four years now and

the bulk of their time has been spent in language study. The Cambodia language consists of 33 consonants, 23 vowels and 12 independent vowels and apparently is a bit of a challenge! However, they have been very active in the Cambodia Baptist Union Church where we attended services on Sunday, September 29. The culture of Cambodia has been greatly influenced by the Khmer

We can learn so much through stories of generosity. The following message from T. Boone Pickens was written prior to his passing on September 11, 2019. He said, "If you are reading this, I have passed on from this world — not as big a deal for you as it was for me."

In my final months, I came to the sad reality that my life really did have a fourth quarter and the clock really would run out on me. I took the time to convey some thoughts that reflect back on my rich and full life.

One question I was asked time and again: What is it that you will leave behind?

I long practiced what my mother preached to me throughout her life — be generous. Those values came into play throughout my career, but especially so as my philanthropic giving exceeded my substantial net worth in recent years.

For most of my adult life, I've believed that I was put on Earth to make money and be generous with it. I've never been a fan of inherited wealth. My family is taken care of, but I was far down this philanthropic road when, in 2010, Warren Buffet and Bill Gates asked me to take their Giving Pledge, a commitment by the world's wealthiest to dedicate the majority of their wealth to philanthropy. I agreed immediately.

I liked knowing that I helped a lot of people. I received letters every day thanking me for what I did, the change I fostered in other people's lives.

Those people should know that I appreciated their letters.

Have faith, both in spiritual matters and in humanity, and in yourself. That faith will see you through the dark times we all navigate. Thank you. It's time we all move on.

(continued from page 1) Rouge which took over the country between 1975-1979 during which time they tortured and murdered about 1.5 million of their own people. We visited the Genocide Museum and saw first-hand the story of evil enacted against the Cambodian People.

Our last day in Cambodia, where Hunter and Mary had travelled with us, we spent the morning with a devotional time; sharing of the trip; prayed: for Hunter and Mary and their work in Thailand, for David, Lauren, and Chloe and their work in Cambodia, and for our team from First Baptist and the work the church is doing through Give Hope, and then took communion together. It was a very powerful reminder that we serve a Good God who loves all people, everywhere and it allowed us to make some deeper connections, which we hope to broaden and deepen between FBC and Thailand and Cambodia.

First Baptist has joined in an effort to help the kids at Martinez Elementary and others in the Abilene and surrounding area by supplying a Care Pack for the weekend. An estimated 1,500 students in the Abilene ISD alone struggle significantly with very little food over the weekend. The schools are able to feed them a quality breakfast and lunch on school days, but on the weekend the kids struggle.

We are asking for volunteers to pack Care Packs every other Tuesday from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. along with other volunteers who are sponsoring other schools in the area. About 1,200 packs are packed each week. It is very organized and time goes quickly! Families are also welcome to sign-up to volunteer. You can sign up for one time or multiple times during the year.

Let us not be like the man in Jesus' parable who spent his life building bigger barns to store all of his wealth and failed to realize his life would be demanded that night. Boone's question remains for us, "What will we leave behind?"

THE LAST ROUND UP

Thirty-five years is but a small measure of time, but certainly the time I've spent at First Baptist has truly been a measure of great importance to me. It has been a time of growth and a time of maturation as well. The Bible tells us that perseverance is what counts...that we finish the race. I am truly grateful for all the leadership roles you have demonstrated during my time at First Baptist. Many thanks to my immediate supervisor as I am sure that I have tried his patience a time or two.

In some ways, it has been quite an education for me. Never one to have much in the parental department, I always had difficulty having to deal with substitute roles. Having a father who was married to his military career and a mother who suffered substantial mental and physical disabilities in her life...I was fortunate that the role models in my life were truly genuine people who went the extra ten yards to show me the graciousness of our Lord.

My favorite scripture to read is 2 Samuel chapter 9. King David's treatment of Mephibosheth is a real eye-opener. Many times God had to intervene in David's life, but here David shows us what it means to keep a promise. David's promise to Jonathan is not only kept, but a greater promise to us is revealed. We know David was a man after the heart of God and in this God breathed scripture, we are shown a greater truth.

Chapter 9 is not a very long chapter but we are reminded twice that Mephibosheth's physical condition did not change. In a time when miracles were being performed and immediate results were taken place we are presented with a much greater scenario.

In fact, there are two scenarios which come to mind here. One with the lights off...and one with the lights on.

Had David chosen to rid the world of Mephibosheth (like all the other kings), indeed Mephibosheth would have been a "dead dog." (Lights out) Where would he go?

But David chose the high ground and Mephibosheth was granted a seat of authority at David's table. (Lights on)

This chapter captures a special moment in David's life as he remembers Saul and Jonathan. (This is how we are remembered) Just as we who read this scripture know that we have a God who keeps His promises (to Abraham and to us) and this should give us the courage we need to tell others about Jesus.

I call this the last round up because as Ziba and his family (entourage) come together to farm the lands, Mephibosheth eventually hands the ownership of the lands to Ziba's people.
