

## **OCTOBER UPDATE FROM THE PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE**

The Pastor Search Committee is swimming in the deep end of the pool these days. We are diving deep into conversations with candidates for the senior pastor position in our church.

After months of preparation and searching, we have arrived at a group of ten outstanding individuals whom we are carefully considering. We divided into three sub-groups for a first round of Zoom interviews with each candidate for the purpose of getting acquainted. Then in the latter part of September, the whole committee met with each candidate for extensive conversations by Zoom, asking them some of our most important questions and also responding to questions they had for us.

As we enter October, the committee is carefully evaluating what we learned from our interviews with the candidates. While they are all remarkable ministers, we are collaboratively considering how the abilities and gifts of each one line up with what our church needs, as described in our congregational conversations and profiles. Then, we will focus on the top candidates, engaging them in additional interviews and checking references.

While we have an overall plan of how to move forward, our process is also organic, in that we are being sensitive to what seems right at each step of the way. Our committee is diverse in background and perspective, brilliantly reflecting the breadth of our "big tent" church. As a result, our conversations about candidates are rich with sensitivity and insight. Most importantly, we are all committed to discerning how the Spirit of God is guiding us to the person who seems best able to lead our whole congregation to fulfill what Christ is calling us to be now and in the future.

Please pray diligently for us in these profound days of seeking and listening. The work is time-intensive, and it's a challenge to fit the many meetings each week into our already busy schedules. Yet, we are singular in our commitment to be faithful on the journey, humbled by the opportunity of service, and joyful about the future of our church – knowing that the one who began a good work in us will bring it to completion.

Over the past few years, I have been in several different conversations with individuals who, with great confidence, state that they are members of First Baptist Church, Abilene. However, I have a brooding sense that what they are stating is not entirely true and I am not sure how to go about correcting them. So, with that preface, let's talk about church membership for a few minutes.

By way of history, there are basically three different methods of church government or polity: Episcopal, Presbyterian, and Congregational. (Note: the use of the word episcopal should not be confused with the Episcopal denomination, but rather the Greek word it is derived from which means "bishop." While the Episcopal denomination employs an episcopal church government, so do other denominations i.e. the catholic church. Also, the word Presbyterian is derived from the Greek word for "elder" and there are many other churches which utilize a Presbyterian church government style.) But, for our discussion, we are going to focus on only two of the three methods: congregational vs. elder (Presbyterian).

In a church which has as their governance the elder method, they would typically have a small group of elders who are tasked with making all of the decisions for the congregation. They are responsible for all personnel decisions, all financial decisions, all property concerns, and set the direction for the church. Typically, the senior pastor is one of the elders and help in the decision-making process as well as communicating with the congregation. Decisions are made by this group and the congregation is informed of what those decisions are.

Churches which are congregational in how they operate, would be considered democratic in the decision-making process. Issues which need to be decided by a vote are taken to the congregation and the congregation, by vote, decides the answer. Typically, there are groups who help in the operation of the church, i.e. committees, and when they have items which need a decision, the congregation makes the decision. Obviously, this is the method of church governance we have here at First Baptist. So, all major decisions are brought before the church and the church votes on them. And, by that vote, the congregation takes ownership of the decision and is held accountable for whatever that decision dictates. That is why we present the annual Ministry Budget to the church for a vote, because the members of the church are held accountable for supporting that budget.

So, what does all that have to do with church membership? First Baptist Church has a Constitution and Bylaws document which guides the church in its governance. In the document, it states what is required for membership and that members are eligible to: vote on all matters of the church, serve on committees and boards, serve as deacons, and serve in leadership roles. The Constitution and Bylaws document has been in place for over 100 years and has served the church well. It states:

#### Article III. Membership

The membership of this church shall consist of persons who have accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and who have obeyed Him in the scriptural ordinance of baptism.

#### Article V. Character

The government of this church is vested in the body of believers who compose it.

We have two very basic requirements for membership: professing Jesus Christ as Lord and baptism by immersion. Baptist, from the very beginning, made believer's baptism the one issue they would not bend on. Following the example of Jesus and being baptized by immersion because of your individual belief in Him as

Lord and Savior was non-negotiable. First Baptist has held that same conviction since 1881 and simply state that to fully be a member means to abide by these two things.

So, why is membership important? Membership in a Baptist church dates back to the middle ages and the protestant reformation. As questions about the Catholic church began to arise and the "protesters" like Martin Luther began to speak out, various groups began to form. One of those was the predecessors of who we are as Baptists today. Because of the threat of persecution by THE Church, these splinter groups needed some way to ensure their own safety and so they developed a means of membership and a letter which the person could take with them to a new town and the Baptist church in that town. Basically, the letter was a promise from church A to church B that the person was not a spy and was in good standing and should be accepted by them. This tradition has continued on and Baptist churches exchange "letters of membership" when someone moves to a new town or to a new church. Once the letter is received, the person is voted on and can fully participate in all aspects of the church.

What if a person comes to FBC, but not from a Baptist church? Membership can be by letter, but also by statement. In the Bylaws, it states:

#### Section 4. Membership by Statement.

A person who joins this church by statement shall be qualified to act and vote in the transactions of the church and shall be obligated to discharge the duties of membership. One may join by statement (1) if the person is or was a member of a church of like faith and order and the person's records, for any reasonable cause, are no longer available or (2) if one is a member of a church of another denomination that has a similar faith and practices immersion according to the scriptural ordinance of baptism.

So, not everyone who joins the church comes from a Baptist background, but they agree with what we believe and abide by those beliefs to be a member.

Just recently, we asked for people to nominate folks who in their estimation would be a good candidate for being a deacon here at FBC. One such individual who was nominated fits the description of what is needed to be a deacon, except they are not a member. They have joined Sunday school, they participate in all aspects of the church, but they have not actually joined the church. Therefore, they are not eligible to be deacon according to our governing documents. Similarly, we are soon (we hope!) to have a person presented to us as our potential new Senior Pastor. After all of the various ways we will get to know this person, they will ultimately be brought before the congregation for a vote. A vote which can only be done by those who are members of the church.

If in the reading of this article some of you are thinking, "Am I really a member?", and you are not 100% sure of the answer, then now would be a great time to talk to one of the pastors and get any questions answered that you might have. We want this to be an easy process and not one which folks are frightened or confused about. Not been baptized by immersion, we can work with you to have that done and if it needs to be a time other than Sunday morning, let's talk. Not entirely sure what professing Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior means, then let's sit down and walk through what God's Word, the Bible, has to say. Just need to talk, then by all means let's talk!
