

SEPTEMBER UPDATE FROM THE PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

After months of preparation, the Pastor Search Committee is now interviewing candidates. Beginning in early June, the committee advertised our search for a Senior Pastor in various state and national outlets. We also followed up on recommendations provided to us by church members and others, as well as contacting church leaders and seminaries who have close knowledge of pastoral candidates whom we might want to investigate.

Most helpful of all, Dr. Matt Cook has been working for months on our behalf through the Center for Healthy Churches and his nation-wide network of contacts to identify potential candidates for our committee to consider. His work is particularly valuable because of his service as our committee's consultant for over a year and his ministry as our interim pastor. He knows us well and is guiding us wisely.

As a result of all these efforts, the committee now has a list of final candidates whose backgrounds and gifts seem most likely to align with the needs of our congregation, as outlined in our Pastor Profile. Our next steps will focus on these candidates; however, we will also be open in the near term to the possibility of adding others to the list.

We have begun initial interviews with our final candidates for the purpose of getting to know them and allowing them to get to know us. These get-acquainted sessions will be followed by two more sets of interviews with candidates over the coming weeks, during which we will have time for in-depth conversations about experience, preparation, faith, preaching, pastoral care, leadership, convictions, maturity, and other key matters related to the expectations of our Congregational Profile.

As a committee, we are thrilled to be at this stage in the transition process, and we feel a sense of both excitement and challenge as we explore with these candidates who they are, who we are as a church, and, most importantly, discern how the Holy Spirit is leading us. We ask in particular that you will faithfully pray in these exciting days for our church, our pastoral staff, and our committee.

God, who has called our church into being, gifted us as a congregation, and guided us through the generations, will certainly continue to care and provide for us in the days ahead. As we consider the future, we can confidently say: eye has not seen, ear has not heard, nor has it entered the mind of anyone what God has prepared for our church as we are faithful.

HEALING HEARTS MINISTRY CELEBRATES 10 YEARS OF MINISTRY

September begins the llth year of ministry for Healing Hearts Ministry. This ministry is a prayer shawl ministry which strives to meet the prayer needs of members of First Baptist Church by making gifts such as shawls, throws, angels, cloths, hats, and "no-sew" fleece blankets as tangible reminders that prayer has been said for the recipient. The ladies who make these gifts pray over them while they are making them, and the group prays over each gift before it is prepared for delivery. When possible, we also gift people in our community and abroad who are connected to our church in some way and are going through significant health issues or who have experienced great loss.

We currently have 17 active members in our group. We would love to have more involvement of anyone who is interested in being a part of this ministry. If you don't know how to knit or crochet, there are other ways to serve in this ministry. We have members who serve as "couriers" who deliver the gifts. We have one person who has worked tirelessly to document our ministry in scrapbooks. I'm sure she would welcome some help with that job. If you are interested in learning to knit with a loom, we could teach you how to make knitted hats. If you know how to make a "no-sew" fleece blanket, or if you would be interested in learning that skill, we could use your help. If you are not interested in any of these ways to serve in this ministry, we still would appreciate your prayers for those of us who are carrying out these tasks.

Our meetings generally happen on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of the month. During those meetings we talk about the prayer needs, pray over each gift, and prepare the gifts for delivery. The meeting time is 3:00 – 4:30 p.m. in Room 6 of University Place (across the street from the church). On the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month, those of us who make the gifts get together to work on our projects.

If you are interested in participating in this ministry, but can't come to the meetings, we can work with you to provide the necessary materials for making your gift at home. If you are interested in helping with the "no-sew" fleece blankets, but don't have much time, you could help with doing the edging that holds the fleece together.

Since September has 5 Thursdays, we will be having the "business" meetings on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month. Those dates are September 8 and 22. Due to my health situation, Marylan Bacon and Suwanee Smith have agreed to lead the meetings if I need to be absent.

STEWARDSHIP By Mike Greenfield

The word stewardship brings to mind all kinds of thoughts and feelings. In the church, it typically is equated with money, followed quickly by time. We hear sermons about being a good steward. We see in scripture numerous pictures and stories about what it means to be a good steward. (See Matthew 20, Luke 12 & 16) We hear statistics that Jesus talked about money more than any other topic except for His Father. So, it must be an important topic and one that we too should investigate.

You cannot talk about stewardship very effectively without talking about tithes and offerings. There is a clear difference between the two and in order to understand one, you need to look at both. According to Dictionary. com, the word *tithe* means:

the tenth part of agricultural produce or personal income set apart as an offering to God or for works of mercy, or the same amount regarded as an obligation or tax for the support of the church, priesthood, or the like.

Now, here at First Baptist, we do not see the tithe as an obligation or tax, but lean towards the offering side of the definition. In scripture, the tithe was the first 10% of the whole. In an agriculture society, it was the first one-tenth or 10% of the harvest. It was brought to the storehouse (Malachi 3:10), or in today's understanding the church. The tithe was just a normal part of life for the Jews. They understood that everything belonged to God and giving back the tenth was just what they were supposed to do. They also understood that to not give was in essence robbing from God. (Malachi 3:8) In the New Testament, we then hear Jesus tell His listeners in Matthew 6:1-18 that when they give, they are to do it a certain way; when they pray, do it in a certain way; and when they fast, also do it in a certain way. Give, pray, and fast, all activities the Jews were familiar with and activities Jesus assumed they would be doing. However, Jesus showed them a better way to understand their relationship with God through those acts. They were to be private, not on display. So, just as Jesus instructed, we hold to that same understanding when it comes to our giving to the church. We do not assess or tax members, but rather totally rely on the members to live their lives according to God's instructions and His understanding of giving. Tithing is between you and God, but the understanding of how it works in your life must be tested against scripture.

What still amazes me is how God takes a group of folks who come from a wide variety of backgrounds, live in all parts of the city, work in every imaginable type of occupations, earn different levels of income, give out of what they have been blessed with, and He adds all of that together to accomplish what His plan is through First Baptist Church, Abilene. Kingdom work which occurs each week through City Light, First Friends, GLO, Family Life Center, Counseling Ministry, ladies Bible studies, men's prayer breakfast, Sunday school, worship—both in the sanctuary and by television, recovery groups, discipleship classes, funerals, weddings, and the list goes on and on. So, from the dime that you give from the dollar you have, God is able to do enormous amounts of ministry! And, He adds all of those dimes together to allow us to support a budget close to 3.5 million dollars. Wow, that is a lot of dimes, but with every dime ministry is accomplished.

September marks the one-year anniversary of Dr. Christopher having retired as Senior Pastor of First Baptist Church. One year ago, we were busy planning that celebration and how we, as a church, could honor him for 26+ years of faithful service to Kingdom work here at FBC. At that time, I knew there would be numerous situations which would arise where simply walking down the hall to his office and asking advice/answers would no longer be an option. Add the education building flood which made his office unusable for several months and the point was driven home even more. Not only was he not there, but his former office was not even usable. For 25 years, 18 of those as Pastor for Administration and Spiritual Development, I worked and walked along side of Phil. I had his back and I know he had mine. They have ensured that all the bills have been paid and ministries are able to continue, though on a scaled back basis due to the shortfall in funds.

However, the greatest joy comes from having two families who love and support me. My family which comes from my bloodline, and my family which comes because of the blood of Jesus Christ shed so that we could have life abundant and life eternal.
