MACEDONIA REPORT

I feel so fortunate to have gone to North Macedonia in June. When we were leaving, I told John Moore that I was a little disappointed we did not have more people on the trip. As always, God plans much better than I do. We had multiple blessings that I don't think would have come about if we had a larger group.

First, we had a last-minute opportunity to help a widow clean out an apartment and get it livable. Due to the small size of the apartment, we could not have fit anymore people in there than what we had. After several hours, trash had been thrown away, rooms rearranged and painted, and she and her nephew were left with a livable space and a path forward to continue improving the apartment.

Next, we were invited by Tony and Atela

of AGA Kitchen to visit the space that CBF helped turn into a commercial grade kitchen. With this kitchen, they have a catering business that is serving as many as 200 meals a day. After touring the kitchen and hearing about their ventures, they took us to eat at a traditional Macedonian restaurant as a show of appreciation for what CBF has done. I don't know what I did to be seen as a big part of CBF, but I wasn't going to turn down their offer of a wonderfully curated dinner.

The success of AGA Kitchen brings me to my other major takeaway from the trip—Sustainability. It is wonderful to see CBF investments not only helping people in the present but also creating returns that can be reinvested in the community. AGA Kitchen is using their resources to help

feed as many needy locals as they can. No food goes to waste. Additionally, they have started giving a portion of their proceeds back to CBF monthly. There are too many other aspects of what they do to list here. They treat everything they do as a chance to support others.

The Lee's work with Poraka (homes for adults with mental disabilities) is another example of investing for the future. They are building and tending greenhouses and gardens that can feed the residents of Poraka, as well as support the local food bank. They have vineyards (and possibly more to be purchased) that can sell grapes yearly to create a return for CBF and others who invest. It is also an opportunity for some of the residents of Poraka to participate in the work of growing and harvesting the grapes.

I could go on for hours about all that we saw and witnessed in the short time we had in North Macedonia, but my words would not do it justice. I highly recommend anyone who can to take a trip to see all that is going on for yourself.

Traveling to North Macedonia for me was such a blessing because I have been praying for Jeff, Alicia, & Ethan Lee since they were commissioned and planning this life change years ago. I loved getting to see where they live, serve, and meet those who they are building amazing partnerships with.

For me, meeting their friends, partners, and ministries was so encouraging. It's just beautiful to see how Jeff & Alicia met so many great people, dreamed together, and made partnerships that benefit their city, communities, & the world.



For example, we spent time with two couples who live, serve, and minister at RETO, a home for men recovering from



addiction. I was encouraged by sitting with them, hearing how they came to serve in this ministry, and hearing stories of the trials and rewards they face daily. I could encourage and edify them in their ministry because we got to see and meet people whose lives have been transformed under their care. They felt God's call to GO and DO, and they are doing that daily while maintaining their sobriety.

Another highlight for me was meeting a family from South Africa who have been serving in Macedonia and partnering with the Lees in many different ways. We were able to visit while cleaning and repairing a widow's apartment. We chatted about raising children and dealing with life while trying to be the hands and feet of Christ. They also felt the call to GO and DO, and it is not easy, but they could testify of God's provision and leadership along the way.

Next, I was in awe of the workers who serve those who were once left in institutions with poor conditions and no hope. They now live in Paroka, a clean and beautiful group home. The beneficiaries are thriving, happy, and working together to help one another live like family. The workers were kind, encouraging, and they shared how they love their friends and their jobs at Poraka and how that had changed their lives.



Whether we are here in Abilene or in North Macedonia, serving the Lord and others is the same. People need the Lord, and we can show His love like our friends in North Macedonia who are delivering food from a food bank, gardening with special friends, or cooking amazing meals for people in need. Therefore, we also should GO & DO the same, wherever we

are, wherever God has planted us.
Romans 10:15 encourages me with the reminder of those who GO & DO...

MINISTRY OF COUNSELING AND ENRICHMENT

The Ministry of Counseling and Enrichment continues to be a therapeutic ministry where people are welcomed from phone call to exit. One of the most difficult aspects about individuals receiving counseling services is making an appointment and arriving for the first session. Ministry of Counseling and Enrichment (MOCE) is unique in that when a person calls, they are able to hear a warm voice on the phone that is ready to listen and instruct regarding next steps. When a person arrives, they are welcomed by caring individuals who see it as part of their ministry to show the love of Christ through kindness and compassion to all who enter.

We are extremely grateful to Office Manager, Tina Hoffman, Billing and Credentialing Specialist, Velma Virgen, and Administrative Assistant, Susan Draper. MOCE is fully staffed and ready to welcome those who are seeking help and healing of all kinds.

July is National Minority Mental Health Month. The goal of this month is to raise awareness to the obstacles that racial and ethnic minorities may encounter when seeking mental health services. According to the FDA, obstacles include a lack of health insurance, less access to treatment, and stigma.

First Baptist Church continues to give faithfully so that the Ministry of Counseling and Enrichment can fulfil the mission of providing mental health services, regardless of an individual's background or ability to pay. Please be in prayer that MOCE would continue to decrease obstacles so more people have access to mental health services in the Big Country.

We are currently short-handed, and I would love for you to be part of this ministry. You can help hand out mail, assist with the clothing closet, or distribute bus passes. But more than that, you'll have the chance to offer a kind word, a warm smile, and a personal connection.

Come meet them. Come love them. Come see our neighbors. Come, be the hands and feet of Christ.

PAWS FOR PEOPLE

Paws for People, FBC's unique pet therapy training mission, is almost as old as the church itself -- in dog years, that is.

About 125 dog years ago (okay, 18 calendar years), retired schoolteacher and dog lover Linda Sikes (now Chisholm) started the program to train dogs and their handlers so that they could visit sick and shut-in FBC members.

All 10 of the dogs from that first class in 2007 have "crossed over the Rainbow Bridge" (passed away) but not before providing comforting visits to patients in hospitals, residents of senior living homes, and elderly homebound members.

Over the years, because of liability issues (no, we didn't bite anyone!) hospitals and nursing homes have required more and more training and vet the dogs carefully. Paws for People graduates are particularly welcome once they have received the American Kennel Club's Good Citizen Award, signifying the highest training. Since last September, Linda has seen 10 more of the PFP graduates receive the AKC award and begin visiting Hendrick Medical Center's hospitals and hospice center, as well as welcoming assisted living centers.

Linda has lost count of dogs in the program, but each class is limited to 10 dogs, and she teaches 4-5 classes a year at the University Place. The next class begins in September. For more information call Linda at (325)725-1741. There's no charge for the classes. New pastor Dr. Ray Miller's admission that he is an Oklahoma University fan prompted Roy Jones to recall his first Paws for People visit:

"Molly, a golden retriever, was the first of four of our dogs to earn the AKC Good Citizen Award. As a diehard University of Texas fan, I had a burnt orange collar and leash for Molly," Roy said.

"In our first visit to a memory care center I was beginning to wonder if we had come to the wrong room. The woman was downright hostile. "That's a beautiful dog you've got but I don't care for the collar and leash," she said.

She went on to complain that her family



had put her in the home against her will and that the worst part was not being able to bring her dogs. Seeking to salvage the visit, Roy asked what kind of dogs she had.

"Boston terriers," she said.

"Those are good dogs," Roy said. "What are their names?"

"Boomer and Sooner," she answered. That explained her hostility!
